16 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

17 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

UNOFFICIAL COPY OF HOUSE BILL 844 Article - Health - General 2 10-620. "Emergency facility" means a facility that the Department (d) (1)4 designates, in writing, as an emergency facility. "Emergency facility" includes a licensed general hospital that has an (2)6 emergency room, unless the Department, after consultation with the health officer, 7 exempts the hospital. 8 10-624. (a) (1)A peace officer shall take an emergency evaluee to the nearest 10 AVAILABLE emergency facility if the peace officer has a petition under Part IV of this 11 subtitle that: 12 (i) Has been endorsed by a court within the last 5 days; or 13 Is signed and submitted by a physician, a psychologist, a clinical (ii) 14 social worker, a licensed clinical professional counselor, clinical nurse specialist in 15 psychiatric and mental health nursing, psychiatric nurse practitioner, a health officer 16 or designee of a health officer, or a peace officer. 17 (2)IF THE NEAREST EMERGENCY FACILITY IS UNABLE TO 18 ACCOMMODATE THE EVALUEE, THE PEACE OFFICER SHALL TAKE THE EMERGENCY 19 EVALUEE TO THE NEAREST AVAILABLE EMERGENCY FACILITY. 20 $(2)^{-1}$ (3)After a peace officer takes the emergency evaluee to an 21 emergency facility, the peace officer need not stay unless, because the emergency 22 evaluee is violent, a physician asks the supervisor of the peace officer to have the 23 peace officer stay. 24 (4)A peace officer shall stay until the supervisor responds to the $\frac{1}{3}$ 25 request for assistance. If the emergency evaluee is violent, the supervisor shall allow 26 the peace officer to stay.

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If a physician asks that a peace officer stay, a physician shall 27 $(4)^{-1}$ (5)28 examine the emergency evaluee as promptly as possible.

29 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 30 October 1, 2005.
