A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Crimes - Inflicting Unnecessary Suffering or Pain on Animals - Prohibition**

3 FOR the purpose of prohibiting a person from inflicting unnecessary suffering or pain
 4 on an animal; repealing the requirement that a person have charge or custody of
 5 an animal, as owner or otherwise, to be prosecuted for inflicting unnecessary
 6 suffering or pain on an animal; and generally relating to the infliction of
 7 unnecessary suffering or pain on animals.

13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
 14 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

15 **Article - Criminal Law**

16 10-604.

17 (a) A person may not:

18 (1) overdrive or overload an animal;

19 (2) deprive an animal of necessary sustenance;

20 (3) INFLICT UNNECESSARY SUFFERING OR PAIN ON AN ANIMAL;

21 [(3)] (4) cause, procure, or authorize an act prohibited under [item (1) or
 22 item (2)] ITEM (1), (2), OR (3) of this subsection; or

23 [(4)] (5) if the person has charge or custody of an animal, as owner or
 24 otherwise[;

25 (i) inflict unnecessary suffering or pain on the animal; or

1 (ii)] , unnecessarily fail to provide the animal with nutritious food in
2 sufficient quantity, necessary veterinary care, proper drink, air, space, shelter, or
3 protection from the weather.

4 (b) (1) A person who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and on
5 conviction is subject to imprisonment not exceeding 90 days or a fine not exceeding
6 \$1,000 or both.

7 (2) As a condition of sentencing, the court may order a defendant
8 convicted of violating this section to participate in and pay for psychological
9 counseling.

10 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take
11 effect October 1, 2005.
