A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Maryland Home Care Services - Personal Care Providers - Reimbursement,**
3 **Training, and Benefits**

4 FOR the purpose of requiring the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to
5 reimburse personal care providers certain amounts for personal care services
6 provided under the Maryland Medical Assistance Program; requiring the
7 Department to develop a certain training program for personal care providers
8 that provide personal care services under the Program; requiring the
9 Department, in consultation with representatives of a public institution of
10 higher education in the State, to develop and implement a curriculum for the
11 training program on or before a certain date; requiring certain State agencies to
12 offer personal care providers that provide personal care services under the
13 Program the opportunity to participate in the training developed by the
14 Department; requiring the Department, on or before a certain date to the extent
15 permitted and subject to appropriations in the State budget, to develop and
16 provide a comprehensive health benefit plan for personal care providers that
17 provide personal care services under the Program; requiring the Secretary to
18 adopt certain regulations; requiring the Department to study the
19 implementation of a comprehensive health benefit plan for personal care
20 providers that provide personal care services under the Program; requiring the
21 Department to report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the
22 General Assembly on or before a certain date; defining certain terms; and
23 generally relating to personal care providers and home care services under the
24 Maryland Medical Assistance Program.

6 Preamble

7 WHEREAS, The State of Maryland has a responsibility to ensure that there
8 are accessible and affordable home- and community-based services available to the
9 frail elderly and individuals with disabilities, and that such services are of high
10 quality and comply with all laws and regulations; and

11 WHEREAS, Stabilizing and expanding the long-term care workforce is among
12 the greatest challenges facing the State; and

13 WHEREAS, Many individuals with limitations on activities of daily living
14 prefer consumer-directed long-term care services in the home and community
15 setting; and

16 WHEREAS, High quality home- and community-based service programs give
17 seniors, individuals with disabilities, and the families of seniors and individuals with
18 disabilities a greater choice in determining the setting of long-term care; and

19 WHEREAS, Home- and community-based services are preferred by
20 consumers and less costly than nursing homes; and

21 WHEREAS, There is a growing shortage of qualified individuals to provide
22 home care services in the State; and

23 WHEREAS, The reimbursement rates for home- and community-based
24 service providers funded by the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to serve
25 the frail elderly and individuals with disabilities are not adequate to retain high
26 quality home care workers; and

27 WHEREAS, The lack of ability to retain high quality home care workers leads
28 to high turnover rates, instability, and lower quality of home care services; and

29 WHEREAS, The State budget has not provided a cost-of-living adjustment for
30 the majority of Personal Care Program providers since 1986; and

31 WHEREAS, There has been no change in the levels of certain reimbursement
32 rates since 1986; and

33 WHEREAS, Consumers are well served by properly funded programs that
34 support self-direction, individual autonomy, dignity, and choice; now, therefore,

35 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
36 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

Article - Health - General

1 15-101.

2 (a) In this title the following words have the meanings indicated.

3 (h) "Program" means the Maryland Medical Assistance Program.

4 (i) "Program recipient" means an individual who receives benefits under the
5 Program.

6 15-142.

7 (A) (1) IN THIS SECTION THE FOLLOWING WORDS HAVE THE MEANINGS
8 INDICATED.

9 (2) "PERSONAL CARE PROVIDER" MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL WHO,
10 THROUGH APPROPRIATE AGREEMENT WITH THE DEPARTMENT, IS IDENTIFIED BY
11 THE ISSUANCE OF AN INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNT NUMBER AS A PROGRAM PROVIDER
12 AND IS ELIGIBLE TO RENDER PERSONAL CARE SERVICES TO RECIPIENTS.

13 (3) "PERSONAL CARE SERVICES" MEANS ASSISTANCE WITH ACTIVITIES
14 OF DAILY LIVING.

15 (B) THIS SECTION APPLIES TO PERSONAL CARE PROVIDERS THAT PROVIDE
16 PERSONAL CARE SERVICES UNDER THE PROGRAM.

17 (C) THE PROGRAM SHALL REIMBURSE PERSONAL CARE PROVIDERS FOR
18 PERSONAL CARE SERVICES RENDERED AT LEAST IN THE FOLLOWING AMOUNTS FOR
19 THE LEVELS OF PERSONAL CARE AS PROVIDED IN REGULATIONS ADOPTED BY THE
20 SECRETARY:

21 (1) \$14 FOR A DAY OF LEVEL 1 PERSONAL CARE;

22 (2) \$24 FOR A DAY OF LEVEL 2 PERSONAL CARE;

23 (3) \$50 FOR A DAY OF LEVEL 3 PERSONAL CARE; AND

24 (4) \$14 FOR A DAY OF TRAINING.

25 (D) (1) THE DEPARTMENT SHALL DEVELOP A TRAINING PROGRAM FOR
26 PERSONAL CARE PROVIDERS THAT PROVIDE PERSONAL CARE SERVICES UNDER THE
27 PROGRAM ON:

28 (I) PROVIDING QUALITY OF CARE TO PROGRAM RECIPIENTS; AND

29 (II) IMPROVING THE SAFETY OF THE WORK ENVIRONMENT.

30 (2) ON OR BEFORE JULY 1, 2006, THE DEPARTMENT, IN CONSULTATION
31 WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF A PUBLIC INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN THE

1 STATE, SHALL DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A CURRICULUM FOR THE TRAINING
2 PROGRAM THAT WILL PROVIDE FOR AT LEAST 80 HOURS OF TRAINING.

3 (3) STATE AGENCIES THAT IMPLEMENT HOME- AND
4 COMMUNITY-BASED SERVICES PROGRAMS SHALL OFFER PERSONAL CARE
5 PROVIDERS THE OPPORTUNITY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE TRAINING DEVELOPED BY
6 THE DEPARTMENT.

7 (E) ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 1, 2006, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL, TO THE
8 EXTENT PERMITTED AND SUBJECT TO APPROPRIATIONS IN THE STATE BUDGET,
9 PROVIDE A COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH BENEFIT PLAN TO PERSONAL CARE
10 PROVIDERS THAT PROVIDE PERSONAL CARE SERVICES UNDER THE PROGRAM.

11 (F) THE SECRETARY SHALL ADOPT REGULATIONS TO CARRY OUT THE
12 PROVISIONS OF THIS SECTION.

13 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

14 (a) The Department of Health and Mental Hygiene shall conduct or
15 commission a study on the implementation of a comprehensive health benefit plan,
16 supported by a combination of public and private funding, for personal care providers
17 that provide personal care services under the Maryland Medical Assistance Program.

18 (b) The Department shall report its findings and recommendations to the
19 Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State Government Article, to the
20 General Assembly on or before October 1, 2005.

21 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take
22 effect July 1, 2005.
