18	MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

21	(a) Subject to the regulations adopted under § 2-503 of this subtitle, a State
	employee may enroll and participate in any of the health insurance or other benefit
23	options established under the Program.

	State may enroll and participate in the health insurance benefit options established under the Program as long as the surviving spouse:
27	(1) is receiving an allowance under Title 29, Subtitle 2 of this article; or

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1 (2) is the sole primary designated beneficiary and receiving a periodic 2 distribution of benefits under an optional retirement program under Title 30 of this 3 article.

4 (c) The surviving minor child or dependent parent of a State Police officer who 5 died while employed by the State may enroll and participate in the health insurance 6 benefit options established under the Program as long as the child or parent is 7 receiving an allowance under Title 29, Subtitle 2 of this article.

8 (D) THE SURVIVING SPOUSE OR DEPENDENT CHILD OF A MEMBER OF THE
9 JUDGES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM WHO DIED WHILE EMPLOYED BY THE STATE MAY
10 ENROLL AND PARTICIPATE IN THE HEALTH INSURANCE BENEFIT OPTIONS

19 (c) (1) If a retiree receives a State disability retirement allowance or has 16

20 or more years of creditable service, the retiree or the retiree's surviving spouse or

21 dependent child is entitled to the same State subsidy allowed a State employee.

22 (2) [In] EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN PARAGRAPH (4) OF THIS SUBSECTION,

23 IN all other cases, if a retiree has at least 5 years of creditable service, the retiree or

24 the retiree's surviving spouse or dependent child is entitled to 1/16 of the State

25 subsidy allowed a State employee for each year of the retiree's creditable service up to

26 16 years.

27 (3) Notwithstanding paragraph (2) of this subsection and subsection

28 (a)(4)(i) of this section, if a retiree is an additional employee or agent of the State

29 Racing Commission, for the purposes of determining a retiree's State subsidy,

30 creditable service shall be determined with respect to service as an additional

31 employee or agent beginning from the initial date of employment or January 1, 1986,

32 whichever is later.

33 (4) THE SURVIVING SPOUSE OR DEPENDENT CHILD OF A RETIREE OF
 34 THE JUDGES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM:

35 (I) MAY ENROLL AND PARTICIPATE IN THE HEALTH INSURANCE
 36 BENEFIT OPTIONS ESTABLISHED UNDER THE PROGRAM; AND

37 (II) IS ENTITLED TO 1/16 OF THE STATE SUBSIDY ALLOWED A STATE
38 EMPLOYEE FOR EACH YEAR OF THE RETIREE'S CREDITABLE SERVICE, UP TO A
39 MAXIMUM OF 16 YEARS.

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1 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 2 October 1, 2005.
