### **Student Health Promotion Act of 2005**

3 FOR the purpose of requiring certain county boards of education to include certain

4 information in certain health instruction; requiring certain county boards to

5 establish a certain nutrition policy by a certain date; providing that a certain

7 nutrition policy to be implemented by a certain school year; requiring certain

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# Preamble

WHEREAS, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimate that61% of Americans are overweight; and

WHEREAS, According to the United States Surgeon General, in the last 20
years the number of overweight children has doubled and the number of overweight
adolescents has tripled; and

18 WHEREAS, The causes of obesity have been linked to an increasing

19 consumption of high-caloric processed foods with high levels of saturated fats and 20 sugges combined with a decreasing amount of physical activity, and

20 sugars combined with a decreasing amount of physical activity; and

21 WHEREAS, Nonfatal but debilitating effects of obesity include respiratory

22 difficulty, high cholesterol, high blood pressure, chronic musculoskeletal problems,23 skin problems, and infertility; and

24 WHEREAS, Potentially life-threatening effects of obesity include 25 cardiovascular disease including hypertension and stroke, conditions associated with 26 including and a stroke, conditions associated with

26 insulin resistance such as Type 2 diabetes mellitus, breast cancer, colon cancer, and

27 gallbladder disease; now, therefore,

28 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF29 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

32 (a) With the assistance of the county health department, each county board33 shall provide:

34 (1) Adequate school health services;

23 (B) (C) THE NUTRITION POLICY ESTABLISHED UNDER SUBSECTION (A) OF
 24 THIS SECTION SHALL BE IMPLEMENTED ON OR BEFORE THE FIRST DAY OF THE
 25 2006 2007 SCHOOL YEAR.

26 (C) (D) EACH COUNTY BOARD SHALL:

27 (1) PROVIDE THE DEPARTMENT WITH A COPY OF THE NUTRITION
 28 POLICY ESTABLISHED UNDER SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION; AND

29 (2) REPORT TO THE DEPARTMENT ANY SUBSEQUENT MODIFICATIONS 30 TO THE NUTRITION POLICY.

31 (A) <u>THIS SECTION ONLY APPLIES TO VENDING MACHINES IN PUBLIC</u>
 32 <u>SCHOOLS THAT SELL FOOD ITEMS OF MINIMAL NUTRITIONAL VALUE, AS DEFINED</u>
 33 <u>BY THE DEPARTMENT.</u>

34(D)(E)(B)BY AUGUST 1, 2006, ALLVENDING MACHINES IN PUBLIC35SCHOOLS SHALL HAVE AND USE A TIMING DEVICE TO AUTOMATICALLY PROHIBIT OR
