1 AN ACT concerning

3 FOR the purpose of providing for the calculation of the width of a motor home or 4 travel trailer; authorizing the State Highway Administration and local 5 authorities to restrict the width of vehicles traveling on certain highways in their jurisdiction under certain circumstances; requiring the State Highway Administration and local authorities to post certain signs if the width of vehicles is limited; increasing the maximum length of a publicly owned rigid bus or Class M motor home when operated on certain highways or routes; increasing the maximum length of a certain maxi-cube vehicle; and generally relating to vehicle laws and maximum vehicle widths and lengths.

6 7 SUBSECTION, FOR purposes of this section, the width of a vehicle includes any load 8 that it carries and shall be exclusive of safety and energy conservation devices, such 9 as side mirrors, turn signal lamps, marker lamps, steps and handholds for entry and 0 egress, flexible fender extensions, mudflaps and spray suppressant devices, and 1 load-induced tire bulges; providing the equipment or device, other than mirrors, does 2 not extend more than 3 inches on each side of the vehicle beyond the statutory width 3 limitation. TRAVEL TRAILER SHALL BE EXCLUSIVE OF RETRACTABLE AWNINGS INSTALLED BY THE VEHICLE MANUFACTURER OR DEALER, PROVIDED THAT THE AWNINGS DO NOT EXTEND MORE THAN 6 INCHES FROM EACH SIDE OF THE VEHICLE.
(b) This section does not apply to any:
(1) Farm equipment;

(ii) As to a highway under the jurisdiction of a local authority, it has special permission from the local authority.
[(2) For a motor vehicle loaded with tobacco hogsheads or sod, the width limit is 102 inches.
(3) For a bus, motor home, or travel trailer on any highway that is part of 34 the interstate system or State primary system or for a publicly owned transit bus, the 55 width limit is 102 inches.

(b) (1) For purposes of this section, the length of a vehicle includes its front and rear bumpers and any part of its load that extends beyond the vehicle, but is exclusive of nonload bearing safety and energy conservation devices, such as marker amps, steps and handholds for entry and egress, front-mounted refrigeration units, and front-mounted air compressors.
(2) The measurement of a combination of vehicles engaged in the transportation of automobiles or boats shall not include the overhang of the ransported vehicles or boats or any retractable device on the rear of the combination when in use to support a transported vehicle.
(c) (1) This section does not apply to any vehicle or combination of vehicles
carrying: carry an indivisible load if the load is not over 70 feet long.
(d) Except as otherwise provided in this section, a bus, a single unit truck, or a Class $M$ motor home may not be over 40 feet long.
(e) (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, a publicly owned rigid bus may not be over 41 feet long.
(2) The length of a [bus on any highway that is part of the interstate system or State primary system may not exceed 45 feet.] BUS, OTHER THAN A PUBLICLY OWNED RIGID BUS OR A CLASS M MOTOR HOME MAY NOT EXCEED 45 FEET BUT MAY EXCEED-40 FEET IF IT IS BEING OPERATED ON:
