Consent Provisions - Minors - Mental or Emotional Disorder

1 AN ACT concerning

3 FOR the purpose of authorizing psychologists to give certain individuals information, without the consent of or over the express objection of a minor, about treatment of a mental or emotional disorder needed by a minor or provided to a minor under certain circumstances; and generally relating to the disclosure of information about the treatment of a mental or emotional disorder of a minor. 8 BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments, Article - Health - General Section 20-104 Annotated Code of Maryland (2000 Replacement Volume and 2004 Supplement) SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 14 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows: Article - Health - General 16 20-104. (a) (1)A minor who is 16 years old or older has the same capacity as an 18 adult to consent to consultation, diagnosis, and treatment of a mental or emotional disorder by a physician, psychologist, or a clinic.

20 (2)The capacity of a minor to consent to consultation, diagnosis, and 21 treatment of a mental or emotional disorder by a physician, psychologist, or a clinic 22 under paragraph (1) of this subsection does not include the capacity to refuse 23 consultation, diagnosis, or treatment for a mental or emotional disorder for which a

24 parent, guardian, or custodian of the minor has given consent.

25 (b) Without the consent of or over the express objection of a minor, the 26 attending physician, PSYCHOLOGIST or, on advice or direction of the attending 27 physician, a member of the medical staff of a hospital or public clinic may, but need 28 not, give a parent, guardian, or custodian of the minor or the spouse of the parent

3 (c) Unless the parent, guardian, or custodian of a minor consents to

4 consultation, diagnosis, or treatment of the minor, the parent, guardian, or custodian

5 is not liable for any costs of the consultation, diagnosis, or treatment of the minor

6 under this section.

7 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect8 October 1, 2005.
