SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A Senate Joint Resolution concerning

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Higher Education - Commission to Study Maryland's Commitment to Higher Education

4 FOR the purpose of establishing a commission to study the coordination, funding,

5 educational delivery, and State commitment to higher education in the State;

6 providing for the membership and appointment of the chairman of the

7 commission; requiring the commission to solicit the views of certain groups in its

8 deliberations; requiring the commission to engage certain services to conduct a

9 certain study; requiring the commission to report its findings and

10 recommendations to the Governor and General Assembly; providing for the

11 staffing of the commission; providing for certain notice procedures for meetings

12 of the commission; and generally relating to establishing a commission to study

13 higher education in the State.

14 WHEREAS, Over 15 years have passed since the General Assembly and 15 Governor created the Maryland Charter for Higher Education; and

16 WHEREAS, The General Assembly and Governor have established several 17 goals for public higher education in Maryland, including the goal of "achieving and 18 sustaining national eminence" and the goal of serving students to "maintain an

19 educated workforce in the State"; and

20 WHEREAS, A major State recession in the early 1990's dramatically affected 21 State funding for higher education; and

WHEREAS, A decade later, another major State recession led to reductions in
 funding for higher education, undoing several years of significant investment in
 higher education by the State; and

WHEREAS, During each recession, tuition increased significantly and unexpectedly, placing a burden on Maryland students and their families; and

27 WHEREAS, Decreased State support leading to increases in tuition is a

28 pattern that occurs across the country and has resulted in some public institutions of

29 higher education placing caps on enrollment, an action that would severely harm

30 Maryland's efforts to serve a growing number of college-age students; and

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1 WHEREAS, Decreased State support for Maryland's public institutions of

2 higher education has caused a reduction in student services and an increase in class

3 sizes and staff layoffs, all of which pose a threat to Maryland's progress towards

4 achieving and sustaining national eminence; and

5 WHEREAS, The General Assembly and the Governor created a "funding 6 guideline" to measure the adequacy of funding for public higher education institutions 7 in Maryland compared to peer institutions around the country. Maryland's progress 8 towards achieving the funding guideline level has declined since fiscal year 2002; and

9 WHEREAS, A more stable funding source for higher education is necessary to 10 meet the goals of the Maryland Charter for Higher Education; and

WHEREAS, Several proposals were introduced during the 2004 Session of the
General Assembly to place limits on tuition increases or to provide predictable State
funding for higher education; and

WHEREAS, House Bill 1188, Higher Education Affordability and Access Act,
was passed by the General Assembly during the 2004 session and vetoed by the
Governor; and

WHEREAS, Maryland can learn from past experiences and the experiences ofother states in managing higher education funding and tuition increases; now,therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That by July 1,
 2005, the General Assembly and Governor shall establish a commission to study the
 coordination, funding, educational delivery, and State commitment to higher

23 education in Maryland; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the commission consider methods to provide a combined level of State funding support and tuition revenue to enable Maryland's public institutions of higher education to meet the goals of the Maryland Charter for Higher Education and the 2004 State Plan for Postsecondary Education, and compete with peer institutions across the country. The commission shall also consider other issues related to State funding and tuition revenue for public institutions of higher ducation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the chairman of the commission shall be jointly appointed by the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House; and be it further

27 RESOLVED, That the commission shall solicit the views of the public,

28 stakeholders in higher education in Maryland, and leading national experts in higher29 education; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the commission shall engage the services of a consultant to
 conduct a study of the linkage of tuition policy, State support to higher education
 institutions, and institutional and State financial aid in order to develop a

33 postsecondary education model to meet the goals established in the 2004 State Plan

34 for Postsecondary Education to maintain the accessibility and affordability of

35 Maryland's higher education institutions; and be it further

36 RESOLVED, That the commission shall review options and make

37 recommendations relating to the establishment of a consistent and stable funding

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1 mechanism to ensure accessibility and affordability while at the same time promoting

2 policies to achieve national eminence at Maryland's public institutions of higher

3 education; and be it further

4 RESOLVED, That the commission report its findings and recommendations to 5 the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State Government Article, to 6 the General Assembly by July 1, 2006; and be it further

7 RESOLVED, That staff for the commission shall be provided and coordinated

8 by the Department of Legislative Services. The Department of Budget and

9 Management, the Maryland Higher Education Commission, and the University

10 System of Maryland shall also assign staff to assist the commission. Notice of each

11 meeting of the commission shall be made public by delivering a copy of the meeting
