Montgomery County - Alcoholic Beverages - Licensed Premises Near Public Libraries MC 507-05

This bill repeals the prohibition in Montgomery County against the issuance of an alcoholic beverages license to an establishment within 750 feet of a public library.

The bill takes effect June 1, 2005.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None.

Local Effect: Minimal increase in license fee revenues. Expenditures would not be affected.

Small Business Effect: Minimal overall, but potential meaningful for businesses near a public library.

Analysis

Current Law: Current law generally prohibits the Montgomery County Board of License Commissioners from issuing alcoholic beverages licenses to businesses within 750 feet of a secondary or elementary school, church, place of worship, public library, or a government-sponsored or operated youth center. With unanimous approval of the Montgomery County Board of License Commissioners, however, an alcoholic beverages license may be issued to businesses within 300 feet of a secondary or elementary school,

church, place of worship, public library, or government-sponsored or operated youth center.

Background: In most counties there are restrictions on the issuance of alcoholic beverages licenses within a certain distance of a church, place of worship, or a school. However, in only three counties – Montgomery, Queen Anne's, and Somerset – is there a restriction on the issuance of an alcoholic beverages license to an establishment within a certain distance of a public library.

There are currently 22 branch locations of the Montgomery County Public Library.

Local Fiscal Effect: It is difficult to predict the precise amount by which liquor license fee revenues would increase as a result of this bill. Any impact would depend on the type and number of license issued as a result of this authority. In any case, it is assumed that this amount would be minimal. Monitoring of the new licenses could be handled with existing resources.
