6. Purpose of Bill					
The bond bill authorizes a State grant to the Board of Directors of Easter Seals Society for Disabled					

Children and Adults, Inc. for construction of a 34,400 square foot Inter-Generational Center with a 32,000 square foot underground garage in downtown Silver Spring, Montgomery County. Plans for the Center include: 1) day services for the elderly and for adults and children with disabilities; 2) inter-generational programming that will include youth from the community; 3) before and after school programs for children; 4) a day care center; 5) inter-generational programming that will include youth from the community for workshops and training programs, and 7) space for the regional administrative offices of Easter Seals.

7. Matching Fund Requirements

This bill requires a matching fund no part of which may consist of in kind contributions or funds expended prior to the effective date of this Act. The matching fund may consist of real property which will be the value of the real property located at Second Avenue and Spring Street in downtown Silver Spring, to be transferred by Montgomery County to Easter Seals. The land has been appraised at \$1,200,000.

9. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization

For more than 70 years, the Easter Seal Society for Disabled Children and Adults, Inc,. has been carrying out its mission of helping individuals with disabilities in Maryland, the District of Columbia, and Northern Virginia live with equality, dignity, and independence. The organization is an independently incorporated 501c3 nonprofit affiliate of Easter Seals National, the nation's oldest nonprofit organization serving people with disabilities. Easter Seals works to create solutions that change the lives of children and adults with disabilities or other special needs and improve the lives of their families.

Easter Seals provides a combination of direct client services and support services to their families, reaching a total of more than 10,000 people a year. The organization offers services in three (3) core programs: 1) early intervention, education, and childcare for children with disabilities; 2) senior and adult day services; and 3) home/community medical rehabilitation therapies for children and adults. Other services include family support groups, early developmental playgroups, community education, information and referral, and public health education.

10. Description and Purpose of Project

Easter Seals has partnered with the Silver Spring downtown redevelopment effort to implement a groundbreaking project to enhance community services and improve the quality of life for families who live and work in Silver Spring and the surrounding communities. Montgomery County has shown its support with the contribution of a \$1.2 million parcel of land located in Silver Spring's central business district.

There is a special need for services for the growing number of seniors who live in this area. Additionally, family caregivers who work in Silver Spring need day services near their place of employment for their loved ones. In a new innovation, Easter Seals will bring together its highly successful programs for seniors and for children and adults with disabilities to create the Inter-Generational Center. The Center will serve clients of all ages with activities that will create opportunities for people to contribute at all stages of life. It will provide direct services to approximately 1,350 clients annually.

The Center will truly be a community hub. In addition to day services for seniors and adults, it will have a geriatric physical therapy center. Pediatric services will include speech and physical therapy, academic tutoring, after-school and summer enrichment programs, and developmental playgroups. The building will also house a family caregiver resource center. Structured inter-generational activities will facilitate regular contact among seniors and youth from the local community groups to hold workshops, training programs, and other kinds of activities. The building will also house the regional administrative offices of Easter Seals.
