Senate Bill 594 (Senators Colburn and Pipkin)

Caroline County - Alcoholic Beverages - Open Containers

This bill makes it a misdemeanor for a person in Caroline County to possess an open container of an alcoholic beverage in specified areas including shopping centers, retail establishments, and any parked vehicle adjacent to or outside a shopping center or retail establishment, unless authorized by the owner of the establishment. A person who violates this provision is subject to a maximum fine of \$100.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Potential minimal increase in general fund revenues from the penalty provision.

Local Effect: Enforcement of open container laws could be handled with existing resources of Caroline County.

Small Business Effect: Minimal.

Analysis

Current Law: In Allegany, Baltimore, Calvert, Carroll, Cecil, Charles, Dorchester, Frederick, Garrett, Harford, Howard, Montgomery, Prince George's, St. Mary's, Somerset, and Wicomico counties, it is illegal to possess an alcoholic beverage in an open container while in specified areas. However, open containers are permitted in specified areas for the counties of Caroline, Carroll, Dorchester, Harford, Montgomery, Prince George's, and Wicomico if the person possesses and presents the written consent of the property owner.

A violation of a provision prohibiting open alcoholic beverage containers is a misdemeanor, subject to a maximum fine of \$100. If an individual is under 18, the individual will be prosecuted as a juvenile. If the individual is 18 or over, the individual will be prosecuted as an adult in District Court. The vast majority of alcoholic beverages violations (for persons at least 18 years old) are adjudicated in the District Court.
