#### 6. Purpose of Bill

The bill authorizes a State grant to the Board of Trustees of Adkins Arboretum, Ltd. for the planning, construction, replanting, restoration and expansion of Adkins Arboretum, Maryland's only arboretum dedicated to the conservation of the region's native plants.

## 7. Matching Fund Requirements

This bill requires a matching fund, which may consist of real property, in-kind contributions, or funds expended prior to the effective date of this Act.

## 9. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization

Adkins Arboretum is a 400-acre native garden and preserve on the Tuckahoe Creek in Caroline County providing education, recreation and research programs, land conservation services, community events, and public outreach to promote the appreciation and stewardship of the region's native plants. Thought the Arboretum was founded in 1980 by the Department of Natural Resources, since 1998 a private not-for-profit organization has operated it under a 50-year lease and receives no state funding for its operating expenses. The Arboretum is a centerpiece for the Mid-Shore's heritage tourism and is recognized as one of the region's successful and important cultural institutions. The Arboretum offers programs on and off-site in ecology, gardening, and natural history for children and adults. Its facilities include four miles of interpretive walks through wildflower meadows and one of the region's most significant forested wetlands, a plant nursery, and a visitor's center with a library, art exhibits, nature displays, plant and gift shop and a large public meeting room. Annually more than 15,000 visitors are attracted to the Arboretum to attend programs and events and to enjoy the grounds. Five thousand of these visitors are children.

## 10. Description and Purpose of Project

Adkins Arboretum is seeking capital funds to support its expansion to meet the current demands of a growing visitorship and to accommodate growth projected over the next decade. Since 1998, the Arboretum's visitorship has growth to 15,00 (70% increase); membership has reached 1,100 (a 28fold increase); over 100 volunteers (a 100-fold increase), 15 full and part-time staff (a 150 percent increase) and new programs. Based on trends during the first two month of 2005, membership is expected to grow 40 percent in 2005. A modest increase in staff to support children's programs will enable the Arboretum to provide programs to reach 20 percent more students than in 2004. The capital improvements are proposed as part of a second phase of development described in the Arboretum's 1999 master plan. The centerpiece of the planned capital improvements is the renovation and expansion of the existing visitor's center. The visitor's center's program facilities are limited to one multi-purpose room for art exhibitions, children's programs, crafts and gardening workshops, lectures, staff work space, and community meetings. Many of these uses are not compatible and are difficult to accommodate within this limited space and as a result at times deny the visiting public access to the room to view exhibits. The proposed expansion of the visitor's center will provide offices and classrooms, a 100-seat meeting room, library, gift shop, gallery, and food concession area. The expansion is planned to address the needs of a growing visitorship and staff expansion projected for the next decade.

The proposed landscape enhancements will include renovating the main public entrance, a new parking area, irrigation, lighting, signage, removal of impervious surfaces, replacing a stormwater drainage system with a natural system that uses vegetative swales, a green for large outdoor community events, redesign and construction of an entrance walk to enable the public to experience intimately the wildflower meadows and gardens. The Arboretum's restored grounds will provide an engaging and educational experience for visitors consistent with the Arboretum's conservation mission.

### 28. Comments:

In 2000-01 the Legislature generously granted Adkins Arboretum capital bond bills totaling \$500,000 for Phase I of a capital improvement campaign that was proposed in the Arboretum's 1999 Master Plan. The required 100 percent match for these funds has been achieved and a portion of the bond bill funds have been expended for site improvements, renovation of the visitor's center lobby, and a new office building located at its plant nursery. This spring the funds will be used for an additional renovation of the visitor's center and to complete the design of a new entrance and parking area using environmentally sensitive techniques. Construction for the Phase II site improvements is planned to begin early 2006. The public's support for the Arboretum and the demand for services and programs have exceeded projections made in 2000, and thus require a more ambitious capital improvement program than was conceived and present to the 2000 Legislature.
