### **Anne Arundel County - Light Wines - Percentage of Alcohol**

This bill increases from 15.5% to 22% the maximum allowable percentage of alcohol that may be contained in light wine in Anne Arundel County.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2005.

## **Fiscal Summary**

**State Effect:** None.

**Local Effect:** Increasing the maximum allowable percentage of alcohol for light wine in Anne Arundel County would not directly affect county finances.

**Small Business Effect:** Overall minimal, but potential meaningful positive impact for those businesses that would be allowed to sell stronger wines under a beer and light wine license.

## **Analysis**

**Current Law:** The maximum allowable percentage of alcohol by volume for light wine in Anne Arundel County is 15.5%.

**Background:** In nine jurisdictions, the maximum allowable percentage of alcohol that may be contained in light wine is 15.5%; in 14 counties – Baltimore, Caroline, Carroll, Dorchester, Frederick, Garrett, Kent, Montgomery, Queen Anne's, St. Mary's, Somerset,

Talbot, Wicomico, and Worcester – the maximum allowable percentage is 22%, and in Harford County the maximum is 23%.

Wine making technology has evolved over the last 20 years and many wines now have alcohol by volume percentages higher than 15.5%. Additionally, new products such as "ice" wines and certain types of brandy and sherry have alcohol content by volume greater than 15.5%.
