A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Veterans Advocacy and Education Act of 2006**

3 FOR the purpose of altering the eligibility requirements for the Edward T. Conroy
4 Memorial Scholarship Program to include certain children of certain members of
5 the armed forces; altering certain disability criteria under the Program; making
6 stylistic changes; establishing the Veterans of the Afghanistan and Iraq
7 Conflicts Scholarship; establishing application requirements for participation in
8 the scholarship; requiring a certain scholarship to supplement certain federal
9 education benefits; providing that each scholarship may be used for certain
10 educational expenses; prohibiting the annual amount of a scholarship from
11 exceeding a certain percentage of the equivalent tuition and certain fees of
12 certain institutions of higher education; requiring a scholarship recipient to
13 maintain a certain grade point average; providing for the duration of the
14 scholarship; requiring funds for the scholarship to be provided in the annual
15 budget of the Maryland Higher Education Commission; requiring scholarship
16 recipients to file for certain federal and State financial aid by a certain date;
17 prohibiting certain scholarships from being awarded after a certain date;
18 permitting certain scholarships to be renewed after a certain date; authorizing
19 legislative scholarship funds to be used for certain purposes; establishing a
20 Veterans of the Afghanistan and Iraq Conflicts Scholarship Fund in the
21 Commission; directing the Commission to use certain gifts and grants for the
22 Fund in a certain manner; requiring the Commission to prepare a certain
23 annual report regarding the Fund; establishing a certain Outreach and
24 Advocacy Program in the Department of Veterans Affairs; requiring the
25 Secretary of Veterans Affairs to appoint a certain director of the Program;
26 providing a salary for and the duties of the director; requiring the Program to
27 help veterans and their dependents become aware of and access certain benefits
28 to which they are entitled under federal, State, and local law; requiring the
29 director to develop and implement a certain veterans outreach plan; authorizing
30 the director to enter into certain contracts and work with certain governmental
31 units and with certain organizations to provide certain information about
32 certain services for veterans; requiring the director to develop certain
33 mechanisms for outreach; requiring the Department to develop and maintain a
34 certain database; requiring the Department, in conjunction with certain

1 organizations to develop a certain survey; requiring the Outreach and Advocacy
2 Program to seek out and track certain veterans and provide certain veterans
3 with certain information; requiring the Secretary to submit a report on or before
4 a certain date of each year to the Governor and the General Assembly; providing
5 a certain death benefit to the surviving spouse, child, dependent parent, or
6 estate of certain individuals serving in the Afghanistan or Iraq conflict under
7 certain circumstances; establishing a Task Force to Study State Assistance to
8 Veterans; providing for the composition of the Task Force; providing for the
9 appointment of the chairman of the Task Force; providing for the staffing of the
10 Task Force; prohibiting members of the Task Force from receiving compensation
11 but entitling members to reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the Task
12 Force to study certain issues and make certain recommendations; requiring the
13 Task Force to submit certain reports to the Governor and the General Assembly
14 on or before certain dates; providing for the application of a certain provision of
15 this Act; providing for the termination of a certain provision of this Act; and
16 generally relating to education, benefits, and benefits assistance for veterans
17 and veterans' families.

10 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
11 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

14 (c) The Program is the Edward T. Conroy Memorial Scholarship Program.

15 (d) A person may apply to the Office for a scholarship under this section if the
16 person:

17 (1) Except as provided in subsection (e) of this section, is a resident of
18 Maryland;

19 (2) (i) Is accepted for admission or enrolled in the regular
20 undergraduate, graduate or professional program at an eligible institution; or

21 (ii) Is enrolled in a 2-year terminal certificate program in which
22 the course work is acceptable for transfer credit for an accredited baccalaureate
23 program in an eligible institution; and

24 (3) (i) Is at least 16 years old and a son or daughter of a member of the
25 armed forces who [was a resident of this State at the time the parent]:

26 1. Died [or was totally and permanently disabled] as a
27 result of military service after December 7, 1941; [or]

28 2. SUFFERED A SERVICE CONNECTED 100% PERMANENT
29 DISABILITY AFTER DECEMBER 7, 1941; OR

30 [2.] 3. Was declared to be a prisoner of war or missing in
31 action, if that occurred on or after January 1, 1960 as a result of the Vietnam conflict,
32 and if the child was born prior to or while the parent was a prisoner of war or missing
33 in action;

1 (ii) Was a prisoner of war on or after January 1, 1960 as a result of
2 the Vietnam conflict and was a resident of this State at the time the person was
3 declared to be a prisoner of war or missing in action;

4 (iii) 1. Is at least 16 years old and a son or daughter of any State
5 or local public safety employee killed in the line of duty; or

6 2. Is the surviving spouse of any State or local public safety
7 employee killed in the line of duty;

8 (iv) Is a disabled public safety employee;

9 (v) Is a veteran, as defined under § 9-901 of the State Government
10 Article, who:

11 1. Suffers a [service-related] SERVICE CONNECTED
12 disability of 25% or greater; and

13 2. Has exhausted or is no longer eligible for federal veterans'
14 educational benefits; or

15 (vi) Is at least 16 years old and a son or daughter of or the surviving
16 spouse of a victim of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks.

18 (A) FOR PURPOSES OF THIS SECTION, AN INDIVIDUAL SERVED IN THE
19 AFGHANISTAN OR IRAQ CONFLICT IF THE INDIVIDUAL WAS A MEMBER OF THE
20 UNIFORM SERVICES OF THE UNITED STATES WHO SERVED IN:

21 (1) AFGHANISTAN OR CONTIGUOUS AIR SPACE, AS DEFINED IN
22 FEDERAL REGULATIONS, ON OR AFTER OCTOBER 24, 2001, AND BEFORE A TERMINAL
23 DATE TO BE PRESCRIBED BY THE UNITED STATES SECRETARY OF DEFENSE; OR

24 (2) IRAQ OR CONTIGUOUS WATERS OR AIR SPACE, AS DEFINED IN
25 FEDERAL REGULATIONS, ON OR AFTER MARCH 19, 2003, AND BEFORE A TERMINAL
26 DATE TO BE PRESCRIBED BY THE UNITED STATES SECRETARY OF DEFENSE.

27 (B) THERE IS A VETERANS OF THE AFGHANISTAN AND IRAQ CONFLICTS
28 SCHOLARSHIP.

29 (C) AN INDIVIDUAL MAY APPLY TO THE OFFICE FOR A SCHOLARSHIP UNDER
30 THIS SECTION IF THE INDIVIDUAL:

31 (1) IS A RESIDENT OF MARYLAND;

32 (2) (I) IS ACCEPTED FOR ADMISSION OR ENROLLED IN THE REGULAR
33 UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM AT AN ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION; OR

34 (II) IS ACCEPTED FOR ADMISSION OR ENROLLED IN A 2-YEAR
35 TERMINAL CERTIFICATE PROGRAM IN WHICH THE COURSE WORK IS ACCEPTABLE

1 FOR TRANSFER CREDIT FOR AN ACCREDITED BACCALAUREATE PROGRAM IN AN
2 ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION; AND

3 (3) (I) 1. IS A VETERAN, AS DEFINED UNDER § 9-901 OF THE STATE
4 GOVERNMENT ARTICLE, WHO SERVED IN THE AFGHANISTAN OR IRAQ CONFLICT;

5 2. IS AN ACTIVE DUTY MEMBER OF THE ARMED FORCES
6 WHO SERVED IN THE AFGHANISTAN OR IRAQ CONFLICT; OR

7 3. IS A MEMBER OF A RESERVE COMPONENT OF THE ARMED
8 FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES OR THE MARYLAND NATIONAL GUARD WHO WAS
9 ACTIVATED AS A RESULT OF THE AFGHANISTAN OR IRAQ CONFLICT DESCRIBED IN
10 SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION; OR

11 (II) IS A SON, DAUGHTER, OR SPOUSE OF:

12 1. A VETERAN OR ACTIVE DUTY MEMBER OF THE ARMED
13 FORCES WHO IS SERVING OR HAS SERVED IN THE AFGHANISTAN OR IRAQ CONFLICT;
14 OR

15 2. A MEMBER OF THE RESERVE OR MARYLAND NATIONAL
16 GUARD WHO WAS ACTIVATED AS A RESULT OF THE AFGHANISTAN OR IRAQ CONFLICT
17 DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION.

18 (D) A SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED UNDER THIS SECTION SHALL SUPPLEMENT
19 ANY FEDERAL EDUCATION BENEFITS FOR WHICH A RECIPIENT QUALIFIES AS A
20 RESULT OF AN INDIVIDUAL'S MILITARY SERVICE OR STATUS AS A DEPENDENT OF A
21 MEMBER OF THE ARMED FORCES OR OF A VETERAN OF THE ARMED FORCES.

22 (E) (1) EACH SCHOLARSHIP MAY BE USED, AT ANY ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION,
23 TO PAY FOR EDUCATIONAL EXPENSES AS DEFINED BY THE OFFICE, INCLUDING:

24 (I) TUITION AND MANDATORY FEES; AND

25 (II) ROOM AND BOARD.

26 (2) THE ANNUAL AMOUNT OF A SCHOLARSHIP MAY NOT EXCEED 50% OF
27 THE EQUIVALENT ANNUAL TUITION, MANDATORY FEES, AND ROOM AND BOARD OF A
28 RESIDENT UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT AT THE 4-YEAR PUBLIC INSTITUTION OF
29 HIGHER EDUCATION WITHIN THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF MARYLAND, OTHER THAN
30 THE UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND UNIVERSITY COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY OF
31 MARYLAND, BALTIMORE, WITH THE HIGHEST ANNUAL EXPENSES FOR A FULL-TIME
32 RESIDENT UNDERGRADUATE.

33 (F) A SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT SHALL MAINTAIN A GRADE POINT AVERAGE
34 OF AT LEAST 2.5 ON A 4.0 SCALE.

35 (G) EACH RECIPIENT OF A SCHOLARSHIP UNDER THIS SECTION MAY HOLD
36 THE AWARD FOR 5 YEARS OF FULL-TIME STUDY OR 8 YEARS OF PART-TIME STUDY.

1 (H) A SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT SHALL FILE FOR FEDERAL AND STATE
2 FINANCIAL AID BY MARCH 1 OF EACH YEAR.

3 (I) (1) THE OFFICE MAY NOT AWARD AN INITIAL SCHOLARSHIP TO AN
4 INDIVIDUAL SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (C)(4) OF THIS SECTION AFTER JUNE 30, 2012.

5 (2) THE OFFICE MAY RENEW A SCHOLARSHIP AFTER JUNE 30, 2012, IF
6 THE INDIVIDUAL RECEIVED AN INITIAL SCHOLARSHIP BEFORE THAT DATE.

7 (J) A SENATOR OR DELEGATE MAY AUTHORIZE THE OFFICE TO AWARD ALL
8 OR A PORTION OF THE FUNDS AUTHORIZED UNDER SUBTITLES 4 AND 5 OF THIS
9 TITLE TO ELIGIBLE RECIPIENTS OF SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED UNDER THIS SECTION.

10 (K) (1) FUNDS FOR THE VETERANS OF THE AFGHANISTAN AND IRAQ
11 CONFLICTS SCHOLARSHIP SHALL BE AS PROVIDED IN THE ANNUAL BUDGET OF THE
12 COMMISSION BY THE GOVERNOR.

13 (2) (I) THERE IS A VETERANS OF THE AFGHANISTAN AND IRAQ
14 CONFLICTS SCHOLARSHIP FUND IN THE COMMISSION.

15 (II) THE COMMISSION:

16 1. MAY ACCEPT ANY GIFT OR GRANT FROM ANY PERSON OR
17 CORPORATION FOR THE VETERANS OF THE AFGHANISTAN AND IRAQ CONFLICTS
18 SCHOLARSHIP FUND;

19 2. SHALL USE ANY GIFT OR GRANT THAT IT RECEIVES FOR A
20 SCHOLARSHIP FROM THE VETERANS OF THE AFGHANISTAN AND IRAQ CONFLICTS
21 SCHOLARSHIP FUND; AND

22 3. SHALL DEPOSIT ANY GIFT OR GRANT THAT IT RECEIVES
23 FOR THE VETERANS OF THE AFGHANISTAN AND IRAQ CONFLICTS SCHOLARSHIP
24 FUND WITH THE STATE TREASURER IN A NONBUDGETED ACCOUNT.

25 (3) (I) AT THE END OF THE FISCAL YEAR, THE COMMISSION SHALL
26 PREPARE AN ANNUAL REPORT ON THE VETERANS OF THE AFGHANISTAN AND IRAQ
27 CONFLICTS SCHOLARSHIP FUND THAT INCLUDES AN ACCOUNTING OF ALL

22 (2) IRAQ OR CONTIGUOUS WATERS OR AIR SPACE, AS DEFINED IN

23 FEDERAL REGULATIONS, ON OR AFTER MARCH 19, 2003, AND BEFORE A TERMINAL

24 DATE TO BE PRESCRIBED BY THE UNITED STATES SECRETARY OF DEFENSE.

25 (b) (1) Subject to subsection (c) of this section and paragraph (2) of this

26 subsection, a death benefit of \$50,000 shall be paid to the surviving spouse, child,

27 dependent parent, or estate of each of the following individuals who is killed or dies in

28 the performance of duties on or after July 1, 1989:

- 29 (i) a law enforcement officer;
- 30 (ii) a correctional officer;
- 31 (iii) a volunteer or career firefighter or rescue squad member; [or]
- 32 (iv) a sworn member of the office of State Fire Marshal; OR

1 (V) A MARYLAND RESIDENT WHO WAS A MEMBER OF THE
2 UNIFORM SERVICES OF THE UNITED STATES SERVING IN THE AFGHANISTAN OR
3 IRAQ CONFLICT.

4 (2) For fiscal year 1999, and for each following fiscal year, the death
5 benefit provided in the prior fiscal year shall be adjusted by any change in the
6 calendar year preceding the fiscal year in the Consumer Price Index (all urban
7 customers - United States city average - all items), as published by the United States
8 Bureau of Labor Statistics.

9 (3) A death benefit under this subsection is in addition to:

10 (i) any workers' compensation benefits;

11 (ii) the proceeds of any form of life insurance, regardless of who
12 paid the premiums on the insurance; and

13 (iii) the funeral benefit provided under subsection (d) of this section.

14 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

15 (a) There is a Task Force to Study State Assistance to Veterans.

16 (b) The Task Force consists of the following members:

17 (1) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of
18 the Senate;

19 (2) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of
20 the House;

21 (3) the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, or the Secretary's designee;

22 (4) the Secretary of Health and Mental Hygiene, or the Secretary's
23 designee;

24 (5) the Adjutant General of the Military, or the Adjutant General's
25 designee; and

26 (6) the following seven members, jointly appointed by the President of
27 the Senate and the Speaker of the House:

28 (i) one member of the Maryland Congressional Delegation, or the
29 member's designee;

30 (ii) one member of the Maryland Veterans Commission;

31 (iii) two veterans, one of whom is disabled and one of whom has
32 separated from military service within the past 2 years;

1 (iv) one individual who is the surviving spouse or parent of a
2 veteran;

3 (v) one individual with knowledge of providing health care services
4 to veterans; and

5 (vi) a representative of the Maryland Higher Education
6 Commission.

7 (c) The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall jointly
8 designate the chairman of the Task Force.

9 (d) The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall make all
10 appointments on or before July 1, 2006.

11 (e) The members of the Task Force shall represent geographic, ethnic, and
12 cultural differences throughout the State.

13 (f) The Task Force may request assistance and information from any
14 government unit or other expert that the Task Force considers appropriate.

15 (g) The Department of Legislative Services shall provide staff for the Task
16 Force.

17 (h) A member of the Task Force:

18 (1) may not receive compensation; but

19 (2) is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State
20 Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget.

21 (i) The Task Force shall study and make recommendations on veterans issues
22 including:

23 (1) the efficacy of the services and benefits for veterans to determine how
24 well the services and benefits help eligible individuals obtain benefits and whether
25 these are being obtained in a timely manner;

26 (2) whether there are enough advocate offices to efficiently help all
27 eligible individuals receive assistance;

28 (3) the potential impact of the increased number of veterans returning
29 from military service in recent conflicts on services provided by the State;

30 (4) what services are provided to veterans, veterans' families and
31 survivors and what services need to be provided including medical care, hospice care,
32 and mental health services;

33 (5) the feasibility of establishing homes for veterans in the Crownsville
34 Hospital Center and other regions of the State;

1 (6) the feasibility of establishing regional outreach and advocacy centers
2 around the State and using existing service centers as outreach and advocacy centers;

3 (7) the identification of State and federal benefits and services and how
4 to make them more comprehensive;

5 (8) how to improve outreach to women who are eligible to receive
6 veteran-related benefits; and

7 (9) any issue regarding benefits and assistance to veterans that the Task
8 Force determines is necessary.

9 (j) The Task Force shall submit an interim report to the Governor and the
10 General Assembly, on or before December 1, 2006, and report its final findings and
11 recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State
12 Government Article, the General Assembly, on or before December 1, 2007.

13 SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That Section 2 of this Act shall
14 be construed to apply retroactively and shall be applied to a Maryland resident who
15 was a member of the uniform services of the United States serving in the Afghanistan
16 conflict on or after October 24, 2001, or the Iraq conflict on or after March 19, 2003.

17 SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
18 June 1, 2006. Section 3 of this Act shall remain effective for a period of 1 year, 6
19 months and 1 day and, at the end of December 1, 2007, with no further action
20 required by the General Assembly, Section 3 of this Act shall be abrogated and of no
21 further force and effect.
