1 AN ACT concerning

Hospitals - Comparable Evaluation System - Health Care-Associated
Infection Information

4 FOR the purpose of requiring a certain comparable evaluation system established by

- 5 the Maryland Health Care Commission to include health care-associated
- 6 infection information from hospitals; requiring the system to adhere, to the
- 7 extent possible, to certain recommendations regarding public reporting of health
- 8 care-associated infections; and generally relating to the inclusion of health
- 9 care-associated infection information from hospitals in a certain comparable
- 10 evaluation system.

16 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF

- 17 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
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Article - Health - General

- 20 (e) (1) The Commission may:
- 21 (i) On or before July 1, 2001, develop and implement a system to
- 22 comparatively evaluate the quality of care outcomes and performance measurements
- 23 of hospitals and ambulatory surgical facilities on an objective basis; and

- (ii) Annually publish the summary findings of the evaluation.

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1 (2)The purpose of a comparable performance measurement system (i) 2 established under this subsection is to improve the quality of care provided by 3 hospitals and ambulatory surgical facilities by establishing a common set of 4 performance measurements and disseminating the findings of the performance 5 measurements to hospitals, ambulatory surgical facilities, consumers, and interested 6 parties. In developing the performance measurement system, the 7 (ii) 8 Commission shall consider the geographic location, urban or rural orientation, and 9 teaching or nonteaching status of the hospital and the ambulatory surgical facilities, 10 and the health status of the population served. 11 (3)The system, where appropriate, shall solicit performance information 12 from consumers. 13 (4)(i) The Commission may adopt regulations to establish the system 14 of evaluation provided under this subsection. 15 Before adopting regulations to implement an evaluation system (ii) 16 under this subsection, the Commission shall: 17 Consider the performance measurements of appropriate 1. 18 accreditation organizations, State licensure regulations, Medicare certification regulations, the quality indicator project of the Association of Maryland Hospitals and 19 20 Health Systems, and any other relevant performance measurements; 21 2. Evaluate the desirability and feasibility of developing a 22 consumer clearinghouse on health care information using existing available data; and 23 3. On or before January 1, 2001, report to the General 24 Assembly, subject to § 2-1246 of the State Government Article, on any performance 25 evaluation developed under this subsection. 26 (5)The Commission may contract with a private entity to implement the 27 system required under this subsection provided that the entity is not a hospital or an 28 ambulatory surgical facility. 29 (6)THE COMPARABLE EVALUATION SYSTEM ESTABLISHED UNDER (I) 30 THIS SUBSECTION SHALL INCLUDE HEALTH CARE-ASSOCIATED INFECTION 31 INFORMATION FROM HOSPITALS. THE COMPARABLE EVALUATION SYSTEM SHALL ADHERE, TO 32 (II) 33 THE EXTENT POSSIBLE, TO THE CURRENT RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FEDERAL 34 CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION (CDC) AND THE CDC 35 HEALTHCARE INFECTION CONTROL PRACTICES ADVISORY COMMITTEE REGARDING 36 PUBLIC REPORTING OF HEALTH CARE-ASSOCIATED INFECTIONS.
