# 1 AN ACT concerning

- 3 FOR the purpose of establishing a Task Force on Indoor Air Quality in Educational
- 4 Institutions; providing for certain membership, duties, and staffing of the Task
- 5 Force; providing for the designation of the chair of the Task Force; requiring the
- Task Force to issue a certain report by a certain date; prohibiting a member of the Task Force from receiving certain compensation; prohibiting a member of

- relating to the Task Force on Indoor Air Quality in Educational Institutions.
- 12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 13 MARYLAND, That:
- 14 (a) There is a Task Force on Indoor Air Quality in Educational Institutions.
- 15 (b) The Task Force consists of the following 24 members:

State agencies represented on the Task Force shall provide staff support 17 18 for the Task Force. 19 (f) A member of the Task Force may not receive compensation for serving on 20 the Task Force, but is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget. 22 A member of the Task Force who misses two meetings of the Task Force 23 may not participate in any decision-making processes or recommendations of the 24 Task Force. 25 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 26 July 1, 2006. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and 1 month and, at the 27 end of July 31, 2007, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this

28 Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
