A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Workers' Compensation - Evaluation of Permanent Impairments - Social**
3 **Workers**

4 FOR the purpose of authorizing certain licensed certified social workers-clinical to
5 perform an evaluation of only the mental or behavioral portion of a permanent
6 impairment in a workers' compensation case under certain circumstances;
7 requiring that the report of an evaluation be submitted to the Workers'
8 Compensation Commission in accordance with the regulations of the
9 Commission; and generally relating to the evaluation of a permanent
10 impairment under workers' compensation law.

21 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
22 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

23 **Article - Health Occupations**

24 19-101.

25 (k) "Practice clinical social work" means to practice social work utilizing the
26 specialized education, training, and experience required under § 19-302(e) of this
27 title.

1 (m) (1) "Practice social work" means to apply the theories, knowledge,
2 procedures, methods, or ethics derived from a formal educational program in social
3 work to restore or enhance social functioning of individuals, couples, families, groups,
4 organizations, or communities through:

5 (i) Assessment;

6 (ii) Formulating diagnostic impressions;

7 (iii) Planning;

8 (iv) Intervention;

9 (v) Evaluation of intervention plans;

10 (vi) Case management;

11 (vii) Information and referral;

12 (viii) Counseling that does not include diagnosis or treatment of
13 mental disorders;

14 (ix) Advocacy;

15 (x) Consultation;

16 (xi) Education;

17 (xii) Research;

18 (xiii) Community organization; or

19 (xiv) Development, implementation, and administration of policies,
20 programs, and activities.

21 (4) For an individual licensed as a certified social worker-clinical,
22 "practice social work" also includes:

23 (i) Supervision of other social workers;

24 (ii) Evaluation, diagnosis, and treatment of psychosocial conditions
25 and mental disorders as defined in § 10-101(f) of the Health - General Article; and

26 (iii) The provision of psychotherapy.

27 19-302.

28 (a) To obtain a license, an applicant shall demonstrate to the satisfaction of
29 the Board that the applicant:

- 1 (1) Has submitted a complete written application in the form prescribed
2 by the Board;
- 3 (2) Is at least 18 years old;
- 4 (3) Is of good moral character;
- 5 (4) Except as otherwise provided in this title, has successfully passed an
6 examination or examinations prescribed by the Board pertinent to the license sought;
7 and
- 8 (5) Has paid all applicable fees specified by the Board relative to the
9 licensure process.

10 (e) To obtain a certified social worker-clinical license, an applicant shall:

- 11 (1) Meet the requirements of subsection (a) of this section;
- 12 (2) Have received a master's degree in social work and documentation of
13 clinical course work from a program accredited by the Council on Social Work
14 Education; and
- 15 (3) Provide in a form prescribed by the Board, documentation of having
16 completed 2 years as a licensee with supervised experience of at least 3,000 hours
17 after receiving the master's degree with a minimum of 144 hours of periodic
18 face-to-face supervision in the assessment, formulation of a diagnostic impression,
19 and treatment of mental disorders and other conditions and the provision of
20 psychotherapy under the terms and conditions that the Board determines by
21 regulation.

22 **Article - Labor and Employment**

23 9-721.

24 (a) Except as provided in subsection (c) of this section, a physician shall
25 evaluate a permanent impairment and report the evaluation to the Commission in
26 accordance with the regulations of the Commission.

27 (b) A medical evaluation of a permanent impairment shall include information
28 about:

- 29 (1) atrophy;
- 30 (2) pain;
- 31 (3) weakness; and
- 32 (4) loss of endurance, function, and range of motion.

1 (c) If a permanent impairment involves a behavioral or mental disorder, a
2 licensed psychologist, A LICENSED CERTIFIED SOCIAL WORKER-CLINICAL, or
3 qualified physician shall:

4 (1) perform an evaluation of only the mental or behavioral portion of the
5 permanent impairment; and

6 (2) report the evaluation to the Commission in accordance with the
7 regulations of the Commission.

8 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
9 October 1, 2006.
