Preamble

WHEREAS, The Maryland State Flag was officially adopted as our State Flagby the General Assembly on March 9, 1904; and

WHEREAS, The Maryland State Flag is the most unique and arguably the mostbeautiful of all state flags;

15 WHEREAS, The Maryland State Flag features four panels with two designs 16 that represent the coat-of-arms of Lord Calvert's family; and

1 WHEREAS, The yellow and black design came from Lord Calvert's father's side,

2 the Calvert family, while the red and white cross design came from his mother's side,3 the Crosslands; and

WHEREAS, During the Civil War, the Union soldiers who fought from
Maryland flew the yellow and black banner while the Confederate soldiers from
Maryland flew the red and white cross banner, which became known as the
"Maryland Cross"; and

8 WHEREAS, After the Civil War, Maryland's Fifth Regiment Armory, which was 9 composed of veterans from the North and the South, adopted a combination banner 10 honoring all those who fought from Maryland. This emblem, resembling the 11 Maryland State Seal, is still used as the insignia for the Maryland National Guard; 12 and

13 WHEREAS, Because the State Flag does not have a distinct top or bottom, it is 14 common to see the flag flown incorrectly; and

15 WHEREAS, An annual Maryland Flag Day would promote education on the 16 history of the flag and how it should be flown; and

WHEREAS, An annual Maryland Flag Day would also promote the display ofthis beautiful banner; and

WHEREAS, There is no other symbol that symbolizes Maryland more than theState Flag; and

21 WHEREAS, Governor Ehrlich proclaimed March 9, 2004, Maryland Flag Day to 22 celebrate the centennial of our State Flag; now, therefore,
