HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

- 1 A House Joint Resolution concerning
- 2 Chesapeake Bay Cleanup and Restoration Federal Funding
- 3 FOR the purpose of urging the President of the United States to reconsider his
- recently released budget proposal and maintain the current levels of federal
- 5 funding for Chesapeake Bay cleanup and restoration efforts, such as sewage
- 6 treatment plant upgrades, oyster restoration, and other existing and beneficial
- 7 programs that are designed to improve the health of the Bay.
- 8 WHEREAS, The Chesapeake Bay is part of Maryland's heritage and culture and
- 9 plays a vital role in many sectors of Maryland's economy, including the commercial
- 10 seafood, recreational fishing, and tourism industries; and
- 11 WHEREAS, The Chesapeake Bay is the largest estuary in North America, and
- 12 the Bay and its tributaries are a national treasure; and
- WHEREAS, Other national treasures, such as the Great Lakes and the
- 14 Everglades, receive 2 to 10 times respectively, more federal funding than what is
- 15 afforded the Bay; and
- WHEREAS, While significant progress has been made in restoring the health of
- 17 the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries, they remain in a significantly degraded
- 18 condition; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Oysters serve as natural water filters and current Bay oyster
- 20 population is at only 2% of historic levels; and
- 21 WHEREAS, The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency estimates that 275
- 22 million pounds of nitrogen enter the Bay every year and in order to make substantial
- 23 progress in Bay restoration, there must be a reduction of at least 110 million pounds
- 24 of nitrogen per year; and

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- WHEREAS, Maryland is a signatory to the Chesapeake 2000 Agreement, in
- 2 which the State pledged significant reduction of nitrogen pollution to improve the
- 3 health of the Bay, with federal funds being an essential part of that process; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The federal budget proposed by the President of the United States
- 5 decreases funding that is vital to continue cleanup and restoration efforts that play an
- 6 important role in improving the health of the Bay, such as a 22% cut to the funding for
- 7 upgrading sewage treatment plants and 86% cut in funding for oyster restoration;
- 8 now, therefore, be it
- 9 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the
- 10 President of the United States be urged to reconsider his budget proposal regarding
- 11 the Chesapeake Bay and maintain current levels of federal funding for Chesapeake
- 12 Bay cleanup and restoration efforts, such as sewage treatment plant upgrades, oyster
- 13 restoration, and other existing and beneficial programs that are designed to improve
- 14 the health of the Bay; and be it further
