	WHEREAS, The Maryland Transit Administration has undertaken the Baltimore Corridor Transit Study - Red Line for a proposed 10-mile rapid transit line for the Baltimore metropolitan area; and
13	WHEREAS, The Red Line transit corridor encompasses a large number of residents, small and large businesses, schools, churches, and other community institutions, all of which are deeply concerned about the future of their communities; and
15 16	WHEREAS, Effective, high quality public transportation is important to these communities; and
	WHEREAS, Public transit must be frequently available, reliable, and safe, and must provide an efficient and economical means to connect community members to major destinations throughout the Baltimore metropolitan area; and
22	WHEREAS, First and foremost, the Red Line should improve the public transportation system in the Baltimore metropolitan region and in the communities surrounding the Red Line transit corridor, and be planned in a manner to serve those communities and foster economic development; and
