6. Purpose of Bill

Authorizing the creation of a State Debt not to exceed \$500,000, the proceeds to be used as a grant to the Board of Trustees of the Baltimore City Historical Society, Inc. for the planning, design, construction, repair, renovation, reconstruction, and capital equipping of the Americans with Disabilities Act required upgrades to the Peale Museum.

7. Matching Fund Requirements

This bill requires a standard match.

8. Special Provisions

The bill requires the grantee to convey to the Maryland Historical Trust a perpetual preservation easement to the extent of its interest in the property.

9. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (3000 characters maximum)

The Baltimore City Historical Society (BCHS) was founded in December 1999 by retired Circuit Court Judge John Carroll Byrnes to fill the void left by the closing of the Baltimore City Life Museum. This closing made Baltimore the only major city in the east without a city historical society. The mission and goals of the organization are stated in the By Laws:

- a) To be a clearing house for historical data related to Baltimore City.
- b) To encourage scholarship and public interest in Baltimore history.
- c) To cooperate with and support the Maryland Historical Society in its mission to preserve and display Baltimore City historical resources.
- d) To support and promote the Baltimore museum community.
- e) To collect Baltimore related publications and art.
- f) To develop and maintain an internet website and such other electronic or other means of communication to facilitate access by the public to pertinent historical resources.

Current Activities:

History Honors: Each year the BCHS names individuals who have made significant contributions to Baltimore history through scholarship or by personal accomplishment. These individuals are honored at the Annual Mayor's Reception.

Joint Education Programs: There are numerous history organizations in Baltimore, each with an interest in a specific subject or historic site -- Civil War Museum; the H.L. Mencken House; the Irish Shrine; the Poe Society; Baltimore Heritage, Inc.; the B & O Railroad Museum, just to name a few. The BCHS mission is to promote and cooperate with these sister organizations. To this end, the BCHS sponsors events at historic sites through out the city, with particular emphasis on new and under-utilized sites. Recent programs took place at Clifton Mansion; Westminister Hall; Old Saint Paul's Rectory; Great Blacks in Wax Museum; the Mitchell Court House; the Reginald E. Lewis Museum and the Babe Ruth Birth Place and Museum.

Newsletter: The BCHS publishes a Spring and Fall newsletter for the purpose of announcing its own programs and those of related organizations in addition to informing its readership of significant events impacting the Baltimore history community.

Book Collection: The BCHS has collected several hundred books and publications on Baltimore and Baltimore history from members and friends. This collection is currently stored at the Maryland Historical Society. Upon completion of the restoration of the Peale Museum building, the collection will be housed in a public reading room at the Peale along with the books on Baltimore archtecture owned by the Baltimore Architecture Foundation, Inc.

10. Description and Purpose of Project (3000 characters maximum)

Baltimore's Peale Museum, a National Historic Landmark, is of unusual architectural, historical and political significance. Designed in 1813 by noted Baltimore architect, Robert Cary Long, Sr., the Peale is the first structure in the Western Hemisphere to be built specifically as a public museum and possibly the second in the world. Further, it is a prime surviving example of the classical revival style popular in Baltimore during the economic boom of the early 19th century.

Rembrandt Peale commissioned the building for a museum which has been described as a "Cabinet of Curiosities" having a variety of scientific, archaeological, natural and performance-based attractions in addition to fine arts. A series of portraits of the heroes of the War of 1812 was part of the original collection. Gas light experiments in the Peale led to the founding of the Gas Light Co. of Baltimore, a precursor of Constellation Energy.

The museum closed in 1829. Purchased by the City of Baltimore, the building served as Baltimore's City Hall from 1830 to 1878 when the seat of government was moved to the present building. From 1878 to 1889, it was an elementary school for African/American children. In 1931, after a major renovation, it opened as the Municipal Museum of Baltimore.

This important structure has been vacant for almost a decade. The BCHS has undertaken the long-term project of reopening the Peale Museum to the public for contemporary adaptive reuse as the Baltimore City History Center. The Center will include an area for exhibits on the history of Baltimore, a public reading room with an extensive collection of books and publications on Baltimore, an auditorium open for use by the City and community groups plus offices for the BCHS, Baltimore Heritage, Inc. and the Baltimore Architecture Foundation, Inc. In addition, its location makes the Peale an ideal, ADA-accessible stop for tourists and local visitors on both the Jonestown and the Mount Vernon Heritage Area Walking Tours.

The first step toward this long-term goal is to prepare architectural drawings based on preservation and structural needs in addition to current code and ADA requirements. Architectural drawings are in process.

Urgency

The need is urgent. The Peale Museum has been vacant for almost a decade with occasional use of the auditorium by the City Fire Department for educational sessions. The roof has a leak; the wood window frames are deteriorating (one on the north side fell out); the brick work needs repointing and homeless people, living in the entry porch, set the building on fire in December 2005. The fire was put out without major damage. All of this a quarter block from City Hall in an area where both mjaor private and public investment is being made. For example, the recent renovation of City Hall Plaza and the conversion of area commercial properties into residences.

Economic Impact

This project will support tourism, an important factor in the economy of Maryland and Baltimore as acknowledged by the recent \$1.5 million increase proposed for tourism in the State budget. When reopened, the Peale will serve the Jonestown and Mount Vernon Heritage Area Walking Tours in addition to being accessible from the Inner Harbor. Further, it will stand on its own as both a tourist attraction and local history center. The building will house exhibits on local history such as the Peale portraits of the heroes of the War of 1812 and a reinstallation of the popular "Row House Exhibit"; a reading room open to the public with books and publications on Baltimore and Baltimore history; an auditorium for community and City use; the offices of three local history organizations: the Baltimore City Historical Society, Inc., Baltimore Heritage, Inc. and the Baltimore Architecture Foundation. ADA accessible facilities will be open to the public
