FISCAL AND POLICY NOTE

House Bill 1491
 Ways and Means

(Delegate Hubbard, *et al.*)

Maryland Youth Advisory Council

This bill establishes a Maryland Youth Advisory Council comprised of 18 high school and college age youths and 3 members of the General Assembly. Members appointed to the council serve staggered two-year terms and may not serve more than two consecutive terms. The council must: (1) examine issues of importance to youth through at least four annual meetings and two public hearings; (2) inform the Executive and Legislative branches about issues important to youth; and (3) conduct an annual seminar for its members regarding leadership, government, and the legislature. The council must also work with the Maryland State Department of Education regarding the granting of school credit for council service. The Department of Legislative Services (DLS) must provide staff support for the council, and the council must report annually on its activities.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: General fund expenditures would increase by an estimated \$30,500 in FY 2007 to provide staff support for the council. Future year expenditure estimates reflect the cost of an annual summer seminar and annualization, regular salary increases, and inflation in the staffing costs. Revenues would not be affected.

Analysis

Current Law: Although they do not technically receive school credit for the activities, students are required to complete either 75 hours of student service or locally-designed programs of student service in order to receive high school diplomas.

Background: The U.S. Census Bureau estimates that there were 5.6 million people living in Maryland as of July 2004, including 1.9 million people, more than one-third of the total population, who are below the age of 25. The estimated population by age is shown in **Exhibit 1**.

The bill mentions the following issues of importance to youth: education; employment; participation in local and State government; health care access and quality of care; substance abuse; emotional and physical health; the environment; poverty; homelessness; and access to services on a local and statewide basis.

State Expenditures: General fund expenditures could increase by an estimated \$30,498 in fiscal 2007, which accounts for the bill's October 1, 2006 effective date. This estimate reflects the cost of hiring a half-time policy analyst at DLS to staff the Maryland Youth Advisory Council and to plan an annual seminar for the council and members of the General Assembly. A half-time salary, fringe benefits, one-time start-up costs, and ongoing operating expenses are included in the estimate.

Future year expenditures reflect: (1) a full-year half-time salary with 4.6% annual increases and 3% employee turnover; (2) an estimated \$18,000 per year to conduct the required annual seminar; and (3) 1% annual increases in ongoing operating expenses.
