6. Purpose of Bill

Authorizing the creation of a State Debt to serve as a grant to the Board of Supervisors of the Talbot Soil Conservation District for the acquisition, planning, design, construction, and capital equipping of a new building.

7. Matching Fund Requirements

The bill requires a standard match.

8. Special Provisions

None.

9. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (3000 characters maximum)

In Maryland, each of the 23 counties is incorporated into a conservation district bearing the name and conforming to the physical boundaries of the county. Districts are made up of landowners and land occupiers, called cooperators, who join together voluntarily with the district in planning for and controlling soil erosion, sedimentation, flooding, and managing animal waste, fertilizers, and agricultural chemicals to protect farmland and water quality.

Districts function independently under the supervision of the district board of supervisors which may receive the guidance of the State Soil Conservation Committee (SSCC) as provided by the Annotated Code of Maryland. Districts are usually funded through a variety of sources including federal, state, and county appropriations, grants, fees for special services, and contributions from local sources. All income is used to promote conservation.

District offices illustrate the unique three-way partnership which enables districts to function. Employees of a district are usually a mixture of federal, state, and local (district) employees all working together toward one common goal. They share office space, are supervised by the board of supervisors and perform their duties as a team. The team is usually made up of USDA's-Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS), the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA), and district employees funded by local and/or state government, or grants.

In addition to the unique three-way partnership that makes up the conservation district, there are several other federal, state, and local agencies and groups that are vital members of the conservation team.

10. Description and Purpose of Project (3000 characters maximum)

Due to the unique three-way partnership that makes up the conservation district, and the close working association and cooperation with several other federal, state, local agencies and groups that are involved in conservation and water quality issues and programs, it is a common goal to have all of the agricultural agencies co-located. This is clearly supported on the USDA website (http://offices.sc.egov.usda.gov/locator/app) stating that USDA Service Centers are designed to be a single location where customers can access the services provided by the Farm Service Agency (FSA), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), and the Rural Development (RD) agencies. Although Talbot County does not have a RD office, it does have other supporting federal, state, and local agencies that would benefit from co-location. Both the University of Maryland Cooperative Extension (CE) and USDA-Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council have offices within Talbot County, but are not co-located.

A combination of the agencies' missions might read that collectively they are customer-driven agencies with a diverse and multi-talented work force, dedicated to achieving an economically and environmentally sound future for American Agriculture while protecting and preserving America's private lands through conserving the soil, water, air, and other natural resources. This carries on through to the local county level by having the unique partnership co-located.

Such lofty goals are accomplished through the many education efforts and the agricultural programs that are offered and administered by the collective agencies. Once again, it is clear to see that this delivery would be enhanced by having as many of the agencies co-located as possible.
