6. Purpose of Bill

Authorizing the creation of a State Debt not to exceed \$1,000,000, the proceeds to be used as a grant to the Board of Directors of the Institute of Notre Dame, Inc. for the planning, design, construction, renovation, reconstruction, and capital equipping of the auditorium and classrooms for a fine arts program expansion.

7. Matching Fund Requirements

This bill requires a matching fund that may consist of real property. No part of the fund may consist of in-kind contributions or funds expended prior to the effective date of the Act.

8. Special Provisions

No part of the proceeds of the bonds or the matching funds may be used for sectarian religious purposes.

9. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (3000 characters maximum)

The Institute of Notre Dame was established in 1847 by the School Sisters of Notre Dame. Its mission is the education of culturally diverse students from the greater metropolitan area. Rooted in a strong foundation of Catholic Christian values, IND is a community of lifelong learners, committed to the education of the whole person, enabling its students to become women of discernment and active leaders in a rapidly changing world.

IND is religiously, racially, ethnically, culturally, economically, geographically, and academically diverse. Our diverse population includes African Americans, Caucasians, Asian Islanders, Native Americans, Asians, Hispanics, and bi-racial students. Currently, 403 students are enrolled at IND. Approximately 30% of our students are non Catholic. Among our student population are Protestant, Jewish, and Muslim students. We accept students at varying academic levels. If a student has low test scores but has a strong moral ground and shows the desire and motivation to achieve, we will accept her and put her into our access program. Students in access classes as freshman are usually brought up to the college prep level by their sophomore year.

Our students come from five surrounding counties and one comes from Pennsylvania. Approximately 37% of our students are from Baltimore City. Our school is located in district 44 and 38% of our Baltimore City students are from districts 44 and 45, two of the poorest districts in Baltimore City.

The Institute of Notre Dame has been located at 901 Aisquith Street since 1847. We are committed to remaining in our East Baltimore City home and to contributing to our community. The Ashland Park Mews II Association uses our building for their meetings. We host a summer program which is free to middle school aged girls form the neighborhood and offers educational enrichment classes in science, technology, drama, and art. IND students serve as big sisters to students from St. Katharine School in a program called Project KIND. Johns Hopkins Medical Center East uses our auditorium periodically for lectures.

We also feel that our location is an important part of the education offered at IND. Our Baltimore City location makes us accessible to children of modest means and enables us to expose young women from surrounding counties to the realities of a low income neighborhood. Additionally, all of our students benefit from the access they have to local companies through internships.

In order to remain in our historic East Baltimore City building, providing a quality education to a diverse population, we need to make various improvements to the building, including the addition of a sprinkler system.

10. Description and Purpose of Project (3000 characters maximum)

As building code and fire safety regulations evolve, IND is often grandfathered because of its age. The Institute of Notre Dame Board of Directors is committed to providing the safest, healthiest environment possible for IND students and staff. To this end, the Board had a fire and life safety base study conducted by EBL Fire Engineering. The decision was made to implement the first level of recommendations immediately. Self-closing and latching doors on stair enclosures were installed. Corridors were compartmentalized. An additional exit from the second floor was added and emergency signage and lights were installed. Now the Board sets its sights on a larger fire safety project, which is to install a sprinkler system throughout the entire building.

We recently received a grant to have a master plan feasibility study conducted. We hired Rubeling & Associates to conduct a study and to provide a master plan for our building based on our safety and curriculum needs. This study showed us that it would cost approximately \$1,662,000 to provide a sprinkler system for 146,000 square feet in the building. This would increase the safety of our students, faculty, and staff dramatically by preventing the spread of a fire should one occur. The safety of our students is our first concern, however, a sprinkler system could also benefit our school by preventing hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage should a fire occur.
