6. Purpose of Bill

Authorizing a grant to the Board of Directors of the Chesapeake Children's Museum, Inc. for the planning, design, construction, installation, and capital equipping of an owl habitat, roof-top observation deck and elevator, and for the repair, renovation, reconstruction, and capital equipping of the multipurpose room at the Chesapeake Children's Museum

7. Matching Fund Requirements

This bill requires a matching fund that may consist of in-kind contributions. No part of the fund may consist of real property or funds expended prior to the effective date of the Act.

8. Special Provisions

None.

9. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (3000 characters maximum)

Chesapeake Children's Museum is a non-profit organization serving children and their families. We provide a setting for informal learning, and by design, informal family support. The building is owned by the City of Annapolis and is situated in a city park at the head of Spa Creek. In addition to the hands-on exhibits and nature trail, children and their familes, school groups, scout troops, etc. can participate in scheduled programs in the arts, sciences and humanities. Our programs have a good reputation for not only engaging children in active learning, but drawing in their adults as well! We like to say, CCM is where children play to learn, and adults learn to play.

The location not only attracts day-trippers to the state capital, county residents, and Annapolitans, but is convenient for many low-income children who can walk to it. These are children who may never visit any other kind of museum.

Another vulnerable audience served are the mothers and other caregivers of very young children who are often isolated in their homes because most of their neighbors are at work. Children's museums across the nation recognize our role as the "new town square" where families can intermingle. On any given day, conversations around Chesapeake Children's Museum reflect the need to connect with other parents - to share helpful resources they have found, to confide each others' tribulations in parenting, to hear and observe effective parenting from each other.

We are serving schools in a limited capacity at present. At best, we bring hands-on workshops to schools, including with the Museum Educatin On Wheels (the MEOW bus), to augment their classroom instruction. Hopefully the proposed additions to the building will allow us to have larger groups come to the museum. In the summer, we often have day camp groups of up to 100 children at a time, taking advantage of the ability to use the outdoor space. We know that most schools will have 3 or 4 classes, up to 120 children, in a grade level, and this is typically how field trips are arranged. We'd like to be able to welcome such groups to our building.

Our mission is to create an environment of discovery about oneself, the peoples, the technologies, and the ecology of the Chesapeake Bay area for all our children and for the child in us all.

10. Description and Purpose of Project (3000 characters maximum)

Owl Habitat: to house a screech owl that cannot be released into the wild due to injuries. The habitat would be visible through a large window in the museum, and accessible for a handler to do presentations for visitors (and to feed the owl, clean the habitat) from a deck off the back of the museum. Teaching wildlife appreciation and husbandry is the purpose for this addition. Multi-purpose room: to provide classroom space for hands-on activities for large groups, as well as community uses such as Parks and Recreation programs, Neighborhood Watch meetings, etc. The existing space is an unfinished storage area. Would need a bathroom added and appliances for light cooking. Adding capacity for group visits to the museum is the primary purpose; adding to community meeting spaces is secondary.

Elevator and Rooftop Observatory: for daytime observations of the surrounding nature (we are close to the Chesapeake Bay - a migratory path for many birds), and for nighttime observations of stars, planets, meteor showers. The elevator would make the building accessible at all three levels, reducing the challenges for some of our visitors to use the downstairs classroom. The educational purpose would be to increase awareness of our natural world.
