State Government - Commemorative Days - Asian Lunar New Year Day

This bill requires the Governor to proclaim the day designated as New Year on the Asian Lunar Calendar as Asian Lunar New Year Day.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Commemorating the Asian Lunar New Year would not affect State finances or operations.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Three official commemorative days and one month are recognized in State law as shown in **Exhibit 1**. In addition, the Governor must issue a proclamation each year encouraging citizens and other individuals to observe a moment of silence at 3 p.m. on Memorial Day to unite in remembrance and commemorate the heroic acts and efforts of Marylanders who have served and died in the United States armed forces.

Background: The new year on the Asian Lunar Calendar begins at the second lunar month after the winter solstice. Approximately 255,000 Asians live in Maryland, representing 4.6% of the State's population. Montgomery County is home to nearly one-half (46.7%) of Asians living in Maryland, with this community accounting for 12.9% of

the county's population. Statewide, the Asian community represents the second fastest growing racial group in Maryland, increasing by 19.4% over the last four years (April 2000 to July 2004) compared to 4.9% for all Marylanders. Most of this increase occurred in five counties: Montgomery (45.9%); Howard (19.4%); Baltimore (11.2%); Frederick (5.0%); and Anne Arundel (4.9%). **Exhibit 2** shows the number of Asians living in Maryland by county as of July 2004.
