Ways and Means Judicial Proceedings

Baltimore County - Gaming - Casino Events

This bill enables a qualified organization in Baltimore County to conduct a casino event that includes a card game once each calendar month. A person that holds a casino event may not allow a player to bet more than \$10 in any one game within the calendar month. The Baltimore County Department of Permits and Development Management must adopt regulations that require a separate permit to be issued for each casino event to be conducted.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2006.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None.

Local Effect: To the extent organizations hold more card games each year, Baltimore County permit fee revenues could increase.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: A qualified organization may conduct one casino event that includes a card game or roulette, per calendar year. A qualified organization includes a volunteer fire company, or a bona fide religious, fraternal, civic, charitable, or war veterans' organization. A person that holds a casino event may not allow a player to bet more than \$10 in any one game.

The Baltimore County Department of Permits and Development Management must adopt regulations to govern: the issuing of casino event permits; and the conduct and management of casino events in a manner designed to prevent fraud and protect the public.

Local Fiscal Effect: The bill allows qualified organizations to hold a casino event that includes a card game as often as once per month, rather than once per year as permitted by current law. The casino event permit fees are currently \$100 per event. Baltimore County did not respond to repeated requests for information regarding the bill's fiscal impact. The extent of any increase cannot be reliably estimated at this time.
