# FISCAL AND POLICY NOTE Revised

## Property Tax - Credit - Firefighters, Law Enforcement Officers, and Public School Teachers

This bill authorizes Baltimore City and county governments to grant a property tax credit for a dwelling owned by a first-time Maryland home buyer who is a firefighter, law enforcement officer, or public school classroom teacher if the dwelling is located in the jurisdiction where the individual is employed. In order to qualify for the credit, the individual must provide specified information to the State Department of Assessments and Taxation (SDAT) to prove first-time Maryland home ownership. The jurisdictions are also authorized to provide for the amount and duration of any credit granted, the criteria and qualifications for eligibility, credit compliance measures, administrative procedures for credit requests, and any other provision necessary to administer the tax credit.

The bill takes effect June 1, 2006 and applies to all taxable years beginning after June 30, 2006.

## **Fiscal Summary**

State Effect: None.

**Local Effect:** Potential local property tax revenue decrease beginning in FY 2007. The amount of the decrease depends on the property tax credit granted, the number of eligible first-time Maryland home buyers, and the value of the property. No effect on county expenditures.

**Small Business Effect:** None.

#### **Analysis**

**Current Law:** Local property tax credits are not provided to first-time Maryland home buyers.

**Local Fiscal Effect:** To the extent that local governments grant the property tax credit authorized by the bill, local property tax revenues could decrease. The actual amount of the decrease cannot be reliably estimated and depends on the number of eligible first-time Maryland home buyers in each county and the value of the property. **Exhibit 1** shows, for illustrative purposes only, the potential effect of a property tax credit for first-time home buyers who are teachers, law enforcement officers, and firefighters living in the county that they work in. County property tax revenues could decrease by at least \$2.2 million in fiscal 2007, based on the following:

- 40% of residential home sales are to first-time Maryland home buyers;
- there are 42,310 certified teachers in Maryland, as shown in **Exhibit 2**;
- there are 14,897 sworn law enforcement employees in Maryland, as shown in **Exhibit 3**;
- there are approximately 6,730 firefighters in Maryland;
- teachers, law enforcement employees, and firefighters make up approximately 2.6% of the total workforce in Maryland;
- approximately 2.6% of owner-occupied residential sales are to teachers, law enforcement officers, and firefighters;
- the number of employees remains constant;
- future year decreases reflect increasing assessments of 10% annually and additional first-time home buyers in subsequent years; and
- local tax rates remaining constant.

Exhibit 2 shows the number of teachers by county for the 2005 – 2006 school year. Exhibit 3 shows the number of sworn law enforcement employees in each county as of October 31, 2004. The figures include the Maryland State Police and county and municipal law enforcement agencies in each county.
