House Bill 1699 (Delegate Bohanan)

Health and Government Operations

Department of Health and Mental Hygiene - Cost of Dispensing Prescription Drugs - Study

This bill requires the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH) to conduct an annual study to determine: (1) the average "cost of dispensing" prescription drugs in the State; and (2) the average additional cost of dispensing Medicaid prescriptions in the State. The bill specifies factors DHMH must consider when determining the average additional cost of dispensing a Medicaid prescription. Further, the bill specifies the steps DHMH must take if it chooses to have a higher education institution or private entity conduct the study. The results of the study must be published publicly. By December 1 annually, DHMH must submit the study and other data to the Governor and the General Assembly, and use the findings to establish the dispensing fees for dispensing Medicaid prescription drugs.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: Medicaid expenditures could increase by \$562,600 (50% general funds, 50% federal funds) to contract with an outside vendor to conduct the required study. Medicaid drug dispensing fees could either increase or decrease by a significant amount, depending on study results. Future year estimates reflect ongoing contracting costs.

Analysis

Current Law: None applicable.

State Fiscal Effect: Medicaid expenditures could increase by \$562,500 (50% federal funds, 50% general funds) in fiscal 2007 to contract with an outside vendor to conduct the study. Future year estimates reflect ongoing contracting costs. This estimate is based on a comparable contract DHMH has issued with an outside consultant to provide auditing services for its nursing home programs.

Furthermore, Medicaid prescription drug costs could increase or decrease by a significant amount, depending on how Medicaid must adjust its prescription drug dispensing fees in accordance with study results. Currently, Medicaid pays a \$3.69 dispensing fee for generic and preferred drugs, and a \$2.69 dispensing fee for nonpreferred drugs. There are insufficient data to reliably estimate any increase or decrease.
