## Public Schools - Summer Learning Pilot Program

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Summer Learning Pilot Program; providing for 4 the purpose of the Program; requiring the State Board of Education to select a 5 certain number of schools to host the Program; prohibiting the State Board from selecting a school for the Program without the approval of the county board of 6 7 education; requiring certain county boards to develop a model summer learning 8 program with a certain curriculum; requiring a county board, in consultation 9 with the State Board, to determine the cost of the Program in that county; 10 requiring a county board to identify funds to pay for a certain percentage of the Program from certain sources; requiring the State to pay certain funds for the 11 12 Program under certain circumstances; requiring the State Board to submit a certain report to certain committees of the General Assembly on or before a 13 14 certain date; and generally relating to the Summer Learning Pilot Program.

21 WHEREAS, Research shows that young people are at risk of experiencing the 22 loss of academic skills if they do not engage in educational activities during the 23 summer months; and

- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the State Board of Education shall report to the Senate Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee on or before December 1, 2008, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, assessing the effectiveness of the Summer Learning Pilot Program established under this Act. The report shall include the following information:
- 9 (1) the before–summer and after–summer academic achievement 10 scores of students attending the Program;
- 12 (2) a comparison of the achievement scores of students who 12 participated in the Program and the students who did not participate in the Program, 13 broken down by socioeconomic category;
- 14 (3) evaluations from parents and participating teachers;
- 15 (4) the number of students receiving meals as required by the free and reduced–price meal program;
- 17 (5) attendance records and the effectiveness of the Program based on attendance; and
- 19 (6) a description of the recruitment campaign and the response to the 20 campaign.
- SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2007.
