- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
 June 1, 2002. It shall remain effective for a period of [6] 8 years and, at the end of
 May 31, [2008,] 2010, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this
 Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
- 30 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

1 (a) The report of the Statewide Advisory Commission on Immunizations that 2 is due on December 15, 2007, shall contain recommendations on whether the State 3 should consider implementing a Universal Vaccine Purchasing System or take other 4 appropriate action to increase access to necessary vaccines.

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- (b) In developing its recommendations, the Commission shall:

- (1) consult with all interested stakeholders;

7 (2) review the structure, cost, scope, success, and implementation 8 issues of similar programs in other states;

9 (3) consider any existing State or federal programs or funds, or any 10 other source of funds, that may be available to mitigate the cost and administrative 11 burden of any proposed new program; and

SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2007. Section 2 of this Act shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and 6 months and, at the end of December 31, 2008, with no further action required by the General Assembly, Section 2 of this Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
