AN ACT concerning

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Procurement – Environmentally Preferable Products and Equipment – Report and Purchase

FOR the purpose of requiring each State unit to purchase certain environmentally preferable products and equipment under certain circumstances; providing for the application of certain dispute resolution procedures; requiring the Board of Public Works to adopt certain regulations by a certain date and to create, update, and make available a certain listing; requiring the Secretary of General Services to review, evaluate, and report to certain persons by a certain date regarding certain aspects of the procurement and use of certain environmentally preferable products and equipment; requiring the Secretary to seek certain information and recommendations from certain persons regarding a certain impact of State procurement of certain environmentally preferable products and equipment; requiring each State unit to provide certain information at a certain time, to establish certain objectives and goals by a certain date, and to initiate certain processes; expressing certain findings of the General Assembly; providing for the application of this Act; defining certain terms; providing for the delayed effective date of certain provisions of this Act; providing for the termination of certain provisions of this Act; and generally relating to the procurement of environmentally preferable products and equipment.

8 9	(v) the feasibility of a pilot program to institute the test-marketing of environmentally preferable products and equipment to State units;
10 11 12 13 14	(4) the short–term and long–term impacts on the overall economy and business climate of the State, including the development of private industry as a result of the increased demand and stable market for environmentally preferable products and equipment, such as annual revenue generated, the number of jobs created, and the amount of revenue to be contributed to the State;
15 16 17	(5) the nature and extent of education, outreach, and management programs necessary to effect environmentally preferable changes throughout all State units, including:
18	(i) promotion of:
19 20 21	1. planning efforts, including the siting, design, construction, and management of State facilities, in an environmentally sound and resource efficient manner;
22	2. changes in employee practices; and
23 24	3. the initiation and expansion of integrated pest management practices; and
25 26	(ii) pilot programs, vendor fairs, workshops, and dissemination of resource materials on environmental purchasing; and
27 28 29	(6) any legislative or regulatory changes necessary in order for each State unit to maximize its purchase and use of environmentally preferable products and equipment.

- 1 (b) In the preparation of the review, evaluation, and report required under 2 this section, the Secretary of General Services shall seek pertinent information and 3 recommendations from representatives of the business community regarding the likely 4 impact of State procurement of environmentally preferable products and equipment, 5 including:
- 6 (1) any business that, as of July 1, 2007, has a contract with the State for the provision of products, equipment, or services; and
- 8 (2) any business engaged in the manufacture, sale, distribution, or 9 repair of environmentally preferable products or equipment within the State, 10 including small resource—based businesses and entrepreneurs.

(c) Each State unit shall:

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- 12 (1) timely provide all procurement information requested by the 13 Secretary of General Services in connection with the review, evaluation, and report 14 required under this section;
- 15 (2) by January 1, 2009, establish short–term objectives and 16 long–range goals to maximize the use of environmentally preferable products and 17 equipment; and
- 18 (3) initiate processes to review internal operations, identify 19 environmental impacts, and make recommendations for the reduction of the 20 environmental impact of its operations.
- SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Board of Public Works shall adopt the regulations required under § 14–402(e) of the State Finance and Procurement Article, as enacted under Section 2 of this Act, by December 31, 2009.
- SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That Sections 1 and 4 of this Act shall take effect July 1, 2009.
- SECTION 6. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, subject to Section 5 of this Act, this Act shall take effect June 1, 2007. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and 7 months and, at the end of December 31, 2008, with no further action required by the General Assembly, Section 3 of this Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
