A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

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Study to Evaluate Strategies to Reduce Deer-Vehicle Collisions

- FOR the purpose of requiring the Department of Natural Resources, the Department of Transportation, and the Department of State Police to jointly conduct a study to evaluate strategies to reduce deer-vehicle collisions; requiring the study to include certain reviews, evaluations, and examinations; requiring the Departments to jointly submit a report to the General Assembly on or before a certain date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to a study to evaluate strategies to reduce deer-vehicle collisions.
- 10 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 11 MARYLAND, That:
- 12 (a) The Department of Natural Resources, the Department of 13 Transportation, and the Department of State Police shall jointly conduct a study to 14 evaluate strategies to reduce deer–vehicle collisions.
 - (b) The study shall include:
- 16 (1) a review of existing literature related to deer-vehicle collision 17 reduction strategies;
- 18 (2) an evaluation of any patterns in the time and location of 19 deer-vehicle collisions;

EXPLANATION: CAPITALS INDICATE MATTER ADDED TO EXISTING LAW.

[Brackets] indicate matter deleted from existing law.

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- 1 (3) an examination of the benefits and problems related to the use of 2 fences and wildlife crossing structures;
- 3 (4) an examination of the use of wildlife warning reflectors and 4 motorist warning devices;
- 5 (5) a review of other mitigation strategies that have been used to 6 reduce deer–vehicle collisions; and
- 7 (6) a review of any other issues that affect the frequency of 8 deer–vehicle collisions.
- 9 (c) On or before October 1, 2008, the Department of Natural Resources, the Department of Transportation, and the Department of State Police shall jointly submit a report to the General Assembly, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, on their findings and recommendations on strategies to reduce deer–vehicle collisions.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2007. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and 4 months and, at the end of October 31, 2008, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
