#### Biodiesel Renewable Fuel Act Task Force on Renewable Alternative Fuels

2 (h) The Task Force shall report its findings and recommendations on or 3 before December 31, 2007, to the Governor, and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the 4 State Government Article, the Senate Finance Committee and the House Economic 5 Matters Committee.

6 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 7 October 1, 2007 July 1, 2007. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and, at the 8 end of June 30, 2008, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this 9 Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
