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## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A Senate Joint Resolution concerning

2 **Veterans Health Care Budget Reform**

3 FOR the purpose of urging the Maryland Congressional Delegation and the United  
4 States Congress to support veterans health care budget reform to allow direct  
5 funding instead of discretionary funding; and generally relating to the veterans  
6 health care budget.

7 WHEREAS, Federal discretionary funding is controlled by the Executive  
8 Branch and Congress through the budget and appropriations process; and

9 WHEREAS, Direct funding provides the Department of Veterans Affairs with a  
10 reliable, predictable, and consistent source of funding to provide timely, efficient, and  
11 high-quality health care for our veterans; and

12 WHEREAS, Currently almost 90% of federal health care spending is direct  
13 rather than discretionary, and only funding for active duty military, Native  
14 Americans, and veterans health care is subject to the discretion of Congress; and

15 WHEREAS, Discretionary funding lags behind both medical inflation and the  
16 increased demand for services; for example, the enrollment for veterans health care  
17 increased 134% between fiscal years 1996 and 2004 and funding, however, only  
18 increased 34% during the same period when adjusted to 1996 dollars; and

19 WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs is the largest integrated  
20 health care system in the United States and has four critical health care missions: to  
21 provide health care to veterans, to educate and train health care personnel, to conduct

1 medical research, and to serve as a backup to the Department of Defense and support  
2 communities in times of crisis; and

3 WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs operates 157 hospitals, with at  
4 least one in each of the contiguous states, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia;  
5 and

6 WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs operates more than 850  
7 ambulatory care and community-based outpatient clinics, 132 nursing homes, 42  
8 residential rehabilitation treatment programs, and 88 home care programs; and

9 WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs provides a wide range of  
10 specialized services to meet the unique needs of veterans including spinal cord injury  
11 and dysfunction care and rehabilitation, blind rehabilitation, traumatic brain injury  
12 care, post-traumatic stress disorder treatment, amputee care and prosthetics  
13 programs, mental health and substance abuse programs, and long-term care  
14 programs; and

15 WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs health care system is grossly  
16 underfunded, and had funding for the Department's medical programs not been  
17 flat-lined as the system sought to admit newly eligible veterans following the  
18 eligibility reform legislation in 1996, the current veterans health care budget would be  
19 approximately \$10,000,000,000 more; and

20 WHEREAS, In a spirit of bipartisan accommodation, members of Congress  
21 should collectively resolve the problem of discretionary funding and jointly fashion an  
22 acceptable formula for funding the medical programs of the Department of Veterans  
23 Affairs; now, therefore, be it

24 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the  
25 General Assembly expresses its profound gratitude for the sacrifices made by  
26 veterans, including but not limited to those who suffer from medical or mental health  
27 problems resulting from injuries that occurred while serving in the United States  
28 Armed Forces at home or abroad; and be it further

29 RESOLVED, That the General Assembly urges the Maryland Congressional  
30 Delegation and all members of Congress to support legislation for veterans health care  
31 budget reform to allow assured funding; and be it further

32 RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of  
33 Legislative Services to the Honorable Martin O'Malley, Governor of Maryland; the  
34 Honorable Thomas V. Mike Miller, Jr., President of the Senate of Maryland; and the  
35 Honorable Michael E. Busch, Speaker of the House of Delegates; and be it further
