Myerberg Senior Center, Inc. for the planning, design, construction, reconstruction, repair, renovation, and capital equipping of an addition to the Edward A. Myerberg Senior Center.

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10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (3000 characters maximum)

The Edward A. Myerberg Senior Center is an activity center for older adults, ages 55+, dedicated to improving their mental, spiritual and physical health through stimulating classes, programs and needed social services. The Center provides over 40 classes a week in art, physical exercise, languages, writing, and seminars in music appreciation from classical to jazz, history and philosophy, Great Books. Stimulating and entertaining programs bring older adults together for friendship and opportunities for socialization. An on-site nutrition program provides a nourishing hot noon meal for over 60 older, more frail seniors five days a week. A 5000 volume library, staffed completely by senior volunteers, provides large print reading materials as well as the latest best sellers and reference books. The Center provides free tax preparation through AARP, driver recertification, medicare part D sign-up through our on-site social worker, help with arraning for reduced home heating and electric bills and other social services.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (3000 characters maximum)

The Center proposes to build a 4000 square foot addition to the Center which will contain a 25000 square foot fitness center with equipment designed specifically for use by older adults, a 1000 square foot painting studio which increases the space for the Center's popular painting classes and provides an expanded space for painting classes which use easels. There will also be a 500 square foot lobby which will house a small café giving people a place to gather for a snack and conversation. Fitness center programming is the direction of the future for senior centers as a means of attracting younger seniors to the Center's extensive programming and to create additional lowcost fitness options for older adults in our community. More people are becoming health conscious. In order to remain relevant for the future and to provide greater opportunities for older adults to maintain and/or improve their health, a fitness center, specifically geared to the needs of older adults is important. Lifebridge Health and Fitness, a member of the Lifebridge Health Systems in Baltimore, has agreed to partner with the Center, providing staffing and programming and oversight for the fitness center.

The Edward A. Myerberg Senior Center serves about 5000 older adults annually. It is a vital community center for older adults of varying ages from 55 to over 100 years. Many people consider it their second home. Our 8 art courses are extremely popular and serve a large number of extremely talented amateur artisits. The Center's 9 exercise classes also serve a large number of older adults, from the most limber and agile to the more frail elderly. Five courses in beginning aerobics and advanced aerobics, 2 courses in seniorcize or chair aerobics for the older more frail adult, 1 course in yoga and recently we added a course in aerobic line dancing. With the addition of the fitness center, we will be able to increase the options for exercise under guided instruction, using equipment that is geared specifically for the abilities and limitations of older adults. The fitness center will be staffed and operated by Lifebridge Health and Fitness. For the first year, fitness instructor salaries will be paid by Lifebridge and all income received from the center will be paid to Lifebridge to cover fitness instructor salaries. A fitness center at the Myerberg would give more older adults the opportunity to participate in exercise as the cost to participate will come out to about \$1.00 per day, a reasonable amount for seniors on fixed incomes.
