6. Purpose of Bill

Authorizing the creation of a State Debt to serve as a grant to the Board of Trustees of the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts, Inc. for the planning, design, construction, renovation and capital equipping of a courtyard and building for the Museum of Fine Arts.

7. Matching Fund Requirements

The grantee shall provide and expend a matching fund. No part of the fund may consist of real property, in kind contributions, or funds expended prior to the effective date of this Act.

8. Special Provisions

Requiring the grantee to grant and convey a certain easement to the Maryland Historic Trust.

10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (3000 characters maximum)

For three-quarters of a century, the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts (WCMFA) has been the premier cultural center for Western Maryland. The Museum's mission is "To collect, to preserve, to interpret, and to exhibit art of lasting quality for the citizens of Hagerstown and the surrounding region." More than 70,000 visitors come to the Museum each year to enjoy world-class exhibitions, concerts, lectures, and arts education classes. The Museum is an important economic driver for the region: our economic impact to the region is approximately \$5 million per year (calculated with the assistance of the Washington County Convention and Visitors Bureau).

WCMFA was a gift of Hagerstown native Anna Brugh Singer and her husband, noted American Impressionist painter William Henry Singer. In discussing the establishment of the Museum, Mrs. Singer explained that she hoped "to give the younger generation a fuller appreciation of joy and beauty than had been afforded me."

The goal of the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts is to welcome all members of the community. In keeping with the wise wishes of the Museum's founders, WCMFA has never charged an admission fee. The Museum maintains close ties with the Washington County Public Schools, local non-profit groups and community service organizations. We are constantly searching for new, relevant collaborations and relationships.

The Museum boasts an outstanding permanent collection consisting of 6,000 works of art. By adhering to the highest professional standards in collection, exhibition and interpretation, the Museum has earned accreditation by the American Association of Museums – a distinction earned by fewer than ten percent of America's museums.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (3000 characters maximum)

WCMFA is creating a master plan for its facilities. Construction will be phased over the next ten to fifteen years. The master plan will allow the Museum to rationally and prudently plan and finance its construction and increased operating costs.

Phase one of construction is the enclosure of the Museum's central courtyard and this will begin as soon as construction documents are completed. Move-in date is anticipated to be January 2008.

Phase two is the renovation of the existing building and the creation of storage and other facilities so the Museum will be in compliance with the industry's best practices.

Phase three will encompass the expansion of the building to better display the permanent collection and to enhance our visitors' experience with improved and up-to-date visitor services.

Phase one of construction, enclosing the central courtyard (the largest room in the building) will provide a sculpture court for permanent collection and traveling shows. WCMFA has a major sculpture collection that belongs to the whole community and little room in which to show it. Sixty-five percent of the important large-scale sculptures in our collection are in storage due to the lack of exhibition space. The covered courtyard will allow us to display these works. From time to time, we could accommodate a traveling show of sculpture in this space because the new room will be climate controlled. This will enable us to be more flexible in our offerings to our audience, thus better serving them. For example, it will provide an additional venue in the building for lectures, music and other educational functions

Architecture also plays an important symbolic and emotional role in a community. The enclosed courtyard will provide the citizens of Hagerstown and Western Maryland with a free, accessible, uplifting public space. It will become a destination point in the area, and make people proud to be citizens of this community. This will add greatly to the quality of life of the community and will function as an important economic development tool.

WCMFA is regarded in the museum industry as one of the finest small art museums in the United States. The collection of more than 6,000 works of art is held in trust for all of the citizens of Maryland. Money from the State to create a master plan and to improve and expand the building will allow WCMFA to better safeguard these public treasures and to display more of them to the public, as always, free of an admission charge.

WCMFA rarely asks the Maryland State Government for large sums of money. The State Arts Council contributes to the Museum's operating fund through the Grants for Organizations program (traditionally 5 to 10% of the operating budget, annually). However, most of our annual funding comes from local donors, local City and County governments, and endowment income. We are a fiscally responsible institution, and do not carry debt. Our annual operating budget is in the range of \$1 million to \$1.5 million, depending on special projects.
