Grant to the Board of Directors of The Baltimore Station, Inc. for the construction of a residential substance abuse treatment facility.

# 7. Matching Fund Requirements

Grantee shall provide and expend a matching fund. No part of the grantee's matching fund may be provided, either directly or indirectly, from funds of the State, whether appropriated or unappropriated. No part of the fund may consist of real property or in kind contributions. The fund may consist of funds expended prior to the effective date of this Act.

## 10. Description and Purpose of Grantee Organization (3000 characters maximum)

The Baltimore Station, founded in 1989, is a theraputic recovery program designed for homeless men suffering from addiction to alcohol and drugs. The program is unique in that the men can stay with the program as full time residents for up to 24 months. There is only one other program in Baltimore that can offer this service. All of the literature on the subject of addiction recovery points to the longevity of the programs as significantly increasing the chances of success.

The Station's program is divided into three segments. First is a thirty day high intensity therapy and counseling program where the men come to grips with their personal responsibility for the situation they have created. The second segment can last up to six months and involves the men working to straighten out specific issues in their lives and preparing for the work force. The final segment which can last for 18 months is the renetry of the men as working, producitve citizens back into the mainstream economy.

Our statistics show that if the men stay through the first segment, thirty days, they have a 65% chance of succeeding in a positive reentry into society.

The Baltimore Station serves up to 90 men at any given time with 50 beds at our South Baltimore location and 40 beds at our Seton Hill location. The South Baltimore Station services predominately Veterans of the Armed Services. Currently 40 of the 50 beds at this Station are occupied by men who served their country through time in the military.

The Baltimore Station works with a number of different partners to provide the best options possible for the men to succeed in turning the corner on their behavior. The Station's partners include health care providers, alternative as well as traditional eductional programs, employment readiness services, and mentoring programs. Through partnering The Station is able to provide an array of services to meet the individual needs of the men while keeping service costs at a minimum. The program staff (counselors, house mangers, nutritionist, operations manager) of the Baltimore Station are all graduates of the program. It is the Station's philosophy that peer counseling has a higher success rate in reaching the men trying to overcome addiction then outside services. The Station raises \$600,000 dollars a year to support its operations and has hundreds of volunteers cooking, serving, and mentoring the residents. The Station's costs are \$35 a bed night. This is well below the cost on incarceration. And for a man to maintain a active heroin addiction he is committing crimes to raise the money he needs to support his habit. The Station is working to reduce this enormous societal financial burden.

The Station is a grassroots effort providing successful theraputic recovery options to men committed to turning their lives around and becoming productive members of society.

#### 11. Description and Purpose of Project (3000 characters maximum)

The Veteran's Administration has awarded the Baltimore Station a \$1,667,534 grant to build an addition to the existing building in order to expand the number of beds available to the community. The addition will include 8 double room occupancy suites and 25 dormitory beds, administrative offices, a counseling center and multi-purpose room as well as allowing The Station to create a better more functional kitchen and eating space. The total cost of the project is estimated at \$4,026,000. The addition will cost \$2,900,000 and the renovation of the existing building will be \$1,125,000.

The construction will allow for the buildings to meet ADA standards.

The design team will be selected in February of 2007 and it is anticipated that construction will start in December of 2007.

Applications to the Abell Foundation and Weinberg Foundation have been submitted for a combined \$1,250,000. The Station has requested the City of Baltimore contribute \$350,000, and the Board of Directors has started a Capital Campaign to raise \$258,000. Responses from Abell and Weinberg are due in late February and the City response is due in March.

This project saves the tax payers of Maryland money over the long term by reducing criminal behavior, eliminating the need for expensive incarceration and returning men to their families as productive citizens.

There is an urgency to obtaining the necessary funds to complete this project in order to not lose the Veteran's Administration grant of \$1,667,543.
