1 AN ACT concerning

2 Vehicle Laws - Parking Violations - Exemption from Signature Requirement

- FOR the purpose of exempting certain parking violations from the requirement for the issuance of a traffic citation that the issuing police officer request that the person committing the violation sign the statement on the citation acknowledging its receipt; and generally relating to citations for parking violations.

- 18 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
- 19 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

20 **Article - Transportation**

- 22 (a) Except as otherwise provided in this section, a vehicle that is stopped or parked on a two-way roadway shall be stopped or parked parallel to the right hand curb or edge of the roadway, with its right hand wheels within 12 inches of that curb

25 or edge of the roadway.

- 1 (b) Except as otherwise provided by local ordinance, a vehicle that is stopped or parked on a one-way roadway shall be stopped or parked parallel to the curb or edge of the roadway, in the direction of authorized traffic movement, with:
- 4 (1) Its right hand wheels within 12 inches of the right hand curb or 5 edge of the roadway; or
- 6 (2) Its left hand wheels within 12 inches of the left hand curb or edge 7 of the roadway.
- 8 (c) The State Highway Administration or any local authority may permit 9 angle parking on the roadway of any highway in its jurisdiction, if the roadway has 10 been determined to be wide enough to permit angle parking without interfering with 11 the free movement of traffic.
- 12 (d) The State Highway Administration or any local authority may place signs 13 that prohibit or restrict the stopping, standing, or parking of vehicles on any highway 14 in its jurisdiction where to stop, stand, or park would:
 - (1) Endanger those using the highway; or
- 16 (2) Interfere unduly with the free movement of traffic on the highway.
- 17 (e) (1) A person may not stop, stand, or park a vehicle on any private 18 property not owned by the owner or driver of the vehicle unless the person has express 19 or implied permission from the property owner, his tenant, or his agent to stop, stand, 20 or park the vehicle, as the case may be.
- 21 (2) In Baltimore City or in any county, upon the request of the owner, 22 his agent, or his tenant, a police officer may issue a citation for a violation of the 23 provisions of this subsection.
- 24 (f) As of October 1, 2010, any sign that designates a parking space or zone 25 for the use of individuals with disabilities shall clearly state the maximum amount of 26 the fine to which a person is subject for parking a vehicle in the parking space or zone 27 in violation of § 21–1003(u) of this subtitle.

- 29 (a) This section applies to all traffic citations issued under this subtitle, 30 unless:
- 31 (1) The person otherwise is being arrested under § 26–202(a)(1), (2), 32 (3), or (4) of this subtitle;
- 33 (2) The person is incapacitated or otherwise unable to comply with the 34 provisions of this section;

$\frac{1}{2}$	(3) The citation is being issued to an unattended vehicle in violation of [$\S 21-1003$] $\S 21-1003$ OR $\S 21-1004$ of this article; or
3 4	$$ (4) The citation is being issued to an unattended motor vehicle in violation of \S 13–402 of this article.
5	(b) On issuing a traffic citation, the police officer:
6 7	(1) Shall ask the person to acknowledge receipt of a copy of the citation, as required under $\$ 1–605 of the Courts Article; and
8 9	(2) If the person refuses to do so, shall advise the person that failure to acknowledge receipt may lead to the person's arrest.
10 11	(c) (1) On being advised that failure to acknowledge receipt of a copy of a citation may lead to arrest, the person may not refuse to acknowledge receipt.
12 13 14	(2) If the person continues to refuse to do so, the police officer may arrest the person for violation of this section or, as provided in $\S 26-202(a)(5)$ of this subtitle, for the original charge, or both.
