CHAPTER \_\_\_\_\_

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Domestic Violence - Permanent Protective Order After Conviction and**  
3 **Imprisonment**

4 FOR the purpose of ~~providing that a protective order is permanent if a respondent is~~  
5 ~~convicted and sentenced to imprisonment for a certain act of abuse~~ requiring  
6 the court to issue a new final protective order against an individual under  
7 certain circumstances; limiting the relief that a court is authorized to grant in a  
8 final protective order issued under this Act; establishing that a final protective  
9 order issued under this Act is permanent unless terminated at the request of  
10 the victim; and generally relating to protective orders.

5 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF  
6 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

7 **Article – Family Law**

8 4–506.

9 (a) A respondent under § 4–505 of this subtitle shall have an opportunity to  
10 be heard on the question of whether the judge should issue a final protective order.

11 (b) (1) (i) The temporary protective order shall state the date and time  
12 of the final protective order hearing.

13 (ii) Unless continued for good cause, the final protective order  
14 hearing shall be held no later than 7 days after the temporary protective order is  
15 served on the respondent.

16 (2) The temporary protective order shall include notice to the  
17 respondent:

18 (i) in at least 10–point bold type, that if the respondent fails to  
19 appear at the final protective order hearing, the respondent may be served by  
20 first–class mail at the respondent’s last known address with the final protective order  
21 and all other notices concerning the final protective order;

22 (ii) specifying all the possible forms of relief under subsection  
23 (d) of this section that the final protective order may contain;

24 (iii) that the final protective order shall be effective for the  
25 period stated in the order, not to exceed 12 months, unless the judge extends the term  
26 of the order, under § 4–507(a)(2) of this subtitle **OR THE RESPONDENT IS**  
27 **~~CONVICTED AND SENTENCED TO IMPRISONMENT AS DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION~~**  
28 **~~(C)(3) COURT ISSUES A PERMANENT ORDER UNDER SUBSECTION (H) OF THIS~~**  
29 **SECTION; and**

30 (iv) in at least 10–point bold type, that the respondent must  
31 notify the court in writing of any change of address.

32 (c) (1) If the respondent appears before the court at a protective order  
33 hearing or has been served with an interim or temporary protective order, or the court  
34 otherwise has personal jurisdiction over the respondent, the judge:

1 (i) may proceed with the final protective order hearing; and

2 (ii) if the judge finds by clear and convincing evidence that the  
3 alleged abuse has occurred, or if the respondent consents to the entry of a protective  
4 order, the judge may grant a final protective order to protect any person eligible for  
5 relief from abuse.

6 (2) A final protective order may be issued only to a person who has  
7 filed a petition under § 4–504 of this subtitle.

8 (3) (i) Subject to the provisions of subparagraph (ii) of this  
9 paragraph, in cases where both parties file a petition under § 4–504 of this subtitle,  
10 the judge may issue mutual protective orders if the judge finds by clear and convincing  
11 evidence that mutual abuse has occurred.

12 (ii) The judge may issue mutual final protective orders only if  
13 the judge makes a detailed finding of fact that:

14 1. both parties acted primarily as aggressors; and

15 2. neither party acted primarily in self–defense.

16 (d) The final protective order may include any or all of the following relief:

17 (1) order the respondent to refrain from abusing or threatening to  
18 abuse any person eligible for relief;

19 (2) order the respondent to refrain from contacting, attempting to  
20 contact, or harassing any person eligible for relief;

21 (3) order the respondent to refrain from entering the residence of any  
22 person eligible for relief;

23 (4) where the person eligible for relief and the respondent are residing  
24 together at the time of the abuse, order the respondent to vacate the home  
25 immediately and award temporary use and possession of the home to the person  
26 eligible for relief or, in the case of alleged abuse of a child or alleged abuse of a  
27 vulnerable adult, award temporary use and possession of the home to an adult living  
28 in the home, provided that the court may not grant an order to vacate and award  
29 temporary use and possession of the home to a nonspouse person eligible for relief  
30 unless the name of the person eligible for relief appears on the lease or deed to the  
31 home or the person eligible for relief has shared the home with the respondent for a  
32 period of at least 90 days within 1 year before the filing of the petition;

1 (5) order the respondent to remain away from the place of  
2 employment, school, or temporary residence of a person eligible for relief or home of  
3 other family members;

4 (6) order the respondent to remain away from a child care provider of  
5 a person eligible for relief while a child of the person is in the care of the child care  
6 provider;

7 (7) award temporary custody of a minor child of the respondent and a  
8 person eligible for relief;

9 (8) establish temporary visitation with a minor child of the respondent  
10 and a person eligible for relief on a basis which gives primary consideration to the  
11 welfare of the minor child and the safety of any other person eligible for relief. If the  
12 court finds that the safety of a person eligible for relief will be jeopardized by  
13 unsupervised or unrestricted visitation, the court shall condition or restrict visitation  
14 as to time, place, duration, or supervision, or deny visitation entirely, as needed to  
15 guard the safety of any person eligible for relief;

16 (9) award emergency family maintenance as necessary to support any  
17 person eligible for relief to whom the respondent has a duty of support under this  
18 article, including an immediate and continuing withholding order on all earnings of  
19 the respondent in the amount of the ordered emergency family maintenance in  
20 accordance with the procedures specified in Title 10, Subtitle 1, Part III of this article;

21 (10) award temporary use and possession of a vehicle jointly owned by  
22 the respondent and a person eligible for relief to the person eligible for relief if  
23 necessary for the employment of the person eligible for relief or for the care of a minor  
24 child of the respondent or a person eligible for relief;

25 (11) direct the respondent or any or all of the persons eligible for relief  
26 to participate in professionally supervised counseling or a domestic violence program;

27 (12) order the respondent to surrender to law enforcement authorities  
28 any firearm in the respondent's possession for the duration of the protective order; or

29 (13) order the respondent to pay filing fees and costs of a proceeding  
30 under this subtitle.

31 (e) In determining whether to order the respondent to vacate the home  
32 under § 4-505(a)(2)(iv) of this subtitle or subsection (d)(4) of this section, the judge  
33 shall consider the following factors:

34 (1) the housing needs of any minor child living in the home;

35 (2) the duration of the relationship between the respondent and any  
36 person eligible for relief;

1 (3) title to the home;

2 (4) pendency and type of criminal charges against the respondent;

3 (5) the history and severity of abuse in the relationship between the  
4 respondent and any person eligible for relief;

5 (6) the existence of alternative housing for the respondent and any  
6 person eligible for relief; and

7 (7) the financial resources of the respondent and the person eligible for  
8 relief.

9 (f) (1) A copy of the final protective order shall be served on the  
10 petitioner, the respondent, any affected person eligible for relief, the appropriate law  
11 enforcement agency, and any other person the judge determines is appropriate, in  
12 open court or, if the person is not present at the final protective order hearing, by  
13 first-class mail to the person's last known address.

14 (2) A copy of the final protective order served on the respondent in  
15 accordance with paragraph (1) of this subsection constitutes actual notice to the  
16 respondent of the contents of the final protective order. Service is complete upon  
17 mailing.

18 (g) (1) Except as provided in ~~paragraph (2)~~ ~~PARAGRAPHS (2) AND (3)~~  
19 of this subsection, all relief granted in a final protective order shall be effective for the  
20 period stated in the order, not to exceed 12 months.

21 (2) A subsequent circuit court order pertaining to any of the provisions  
22 included in the final protective order shall supersede those provisions in the final  
23 protective order.

24 ~~(3) IF A RESPONDENT IS CONVICTED AND SENTENCED TO~~

28 (H) (1) NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER PROVISION OF THIS SECTION,  
29 THE COURT SHALL ISSUE A NEW FINAL PROTECTIVE ORDER AGAINST AN  
30 INDIVIDUAL IF:

31 (I) THE INDIVIDUAL WAS PREVIOUSLY A RESPONDENT  
32 UNDER THIS SUBTITLE AGAINST WHOM A FINAL PROTECTIVE ORDER WAS  
33 ISSUED;

1                    (II) THE INDIVIDUAL WAS CONVICTED AND SERVED A TERM  
 2 OF IMPRISONMENT OF AT LEAST 5 YEARS UNDER § 2-205, § 2-206, § 3-202, §  
 3 3-303, § 3-304, § 3-305, § 3-306, § 3-309, § 3-310, § 3-311, OR § 3-312 OF THE  
 4 CRIMINAL LAW ARTICLE FOR THE ACT OF ABUSE THAT LED TO THE ISSUANCE  
 5 OF THE FINAL PROTECTIVE ORDER; AND

6                    (III) THE VICTIM OF THE ABUSE WHO WAS THE PERSON  
 7 ELIGIBLE FOR RELIEF IN THE ORIGINAL FINAL PROTECTIVE ORDER REQUESTS  
 8 THE ISSUANCE OF A NEW FINAL PROTECTIVE ORDER ~~WITHIN A REASONABLE~~  
 9 ~~TIME AFTER THE RELEASE OF THE INDIVIDUAL FROM THE TERM OF~~  
 10 ~~IMPRISONMENT.~~

11                    (2) IN A FINAL PROTECTIVE ORDER ISSUED UNDER THIS  
 12 SUBSECTION, THE COURT MAY GRANT ONLY THE RELIEF THAT WAS GRANTED IN  
 13 THE ORIGINAL PROTECTIVE ORDER UNDER SUBSECTION (D)(1) OR (2) OF THIS  
 14 SECTION.

15                    (3) UNLESS TERMINATED AT THE REQUEST OF THE VICTIM, A  
 16 FINAL PROTECTIVE ORDER ISSUED UNDER THIS SUBSECTION SHALL BE  
 17 PERMANENT.

18                    SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect  
 19 October 1, 2008.
