A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 Transportation – Feasibility Study of Rail Transit Service for Annapolis

3 FOR the purpose of requiring the Department of Transportation to study options for 4 providing rail transportation in the Annapolis area and between greater 5 Annapolis and the Washington, D.C. and Baltimore metropolitan areas and to 6 report its findings and recommendations by a certain date; requiring the 7 Department to use existing resources to conduct the study and to make findings 8 and recommendations; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally 9 relating to a study of rail transit service in the greater Annapolis area and between greater Annapolis and the Washington, D.C. and Baltimore 10 11 metropolitan areas.

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Preamble

13 WHEREAS, Traffic in the West Street corridor of Annapolis already is 14 excessively congested and population density in that area continues to increase with 15 the construction of many new developments, including Park Place and 1901 West 16 Street; and

- WHEREAS, For a number of years in the early 20th century from 1908 until
 1935 an Annapolis trolley rail system was located, in part, along West Street; and
- WHEREAS, Technology now exists that better enables light rail trains to share
 more effectively and safely street rights-of-way with vehicular traffic; and
- 21 WHEREAS, Light rail trains that allow easier ground level access for both 22 able–bodied and disabled riders also are now commercially available; and
- 23 WHEREAS, The traffic volume between greater Annapolis and the Washington, 24 D.C. metropolitan area continues to increase significantly, with average daily traffic

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1 on U.S. Route 50 between Maryland Route 685 and I–97 having increased from 148,375 vehicles in 2000 to 153,480 vehicles in 2006; and

WHEREAS, More than 10 percent of the workers residing in the greater Annapolis area commute to the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area to work while, conversely, more than four percent of the workers in the greater Annapolis area reside in and commute from the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area to the greater Annapolis area; and

8 WHEREAS, More than six percent of the workers residing in the greater 9 Annapolis area commute to the Baltimore metropolitan area to work while, conversely, 10 almost eight percent of the workers in the greater Annapolis area reside in and 11 commute from the Baltimore metropolitan area to the greater Annapolis area; and

12 WHEREAS, Based on U.S. census data, Annapolis is part of the Baltimore 13 metropolitan area as defined by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget; and

WHEREAS, Transportation planning funding for the greater Annapolis area flows through the Baltimore Regional Transportation Board (BRTB) while planning funding for the Washington metropolitan area flows through the Washington Council of Governments (WASHCOG), thus complicating the possible funding of projects like a rail transit line between the greater Annapolis area and the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area; and

WHEREAS, Neither WASHCOG nor BRTB currently are undertaking or considering any significant studies of rail transportation links between the greater Annapolis area and the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area; now, therefore,

23 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 24 MARYLAND, That:

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(a) The Maryland Department of Transportation shall undertake a study to:

(1) consider the feasibility of funding and constructing light rail
 transit facilities in the West Street corridor of Annapolis between the Historic District
 of Annapolis and the Town Center at Parole; and

(2) assess options to provide rail transportation between the greater
 Annapolis area and the Washington, D.C. and Baltimore metropolitan areas, including
 an evaluation of the costs, benefits, and feasibility of designing and constructing one or
 more rail links between Annapolis and:

(i) the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority
 (Metro) rail system with possible connections to the Metro's Orange and Blue lines;

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- (ii) the Baltimore light rail transit system; and
- 36 (iii) the Maryland Rail Commuter (MARC) train.

1 (b) On or before December 1, 2009, the Maryland Department of 2 Transportation shall report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and, in 3 accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.

4 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Maryland 5 Department of Transportation shall use existing resources to conduct the study and 6 make findings and recommendations as specified under Section 1 of this Act.

SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
July 1, 2008. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and 6 months and, at the
end of December 31, 2009, with no further action required by the General Assembly,
this Act shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
