16 17	(c) (1) A person may not possess stolen personal property knowing that it has been stolen, or believing that it probably has been stolen, if the person:
18	(i) intends to deprive the owner of the property;
19 20	(ii) willfully or knowingly uses, conceals, or abandons the property in a manner that deprives the owner of the property; or
21 22	(iii) uses, conceals, or abandons the property knowing that the use, concealment, or abandonment probably will deprive the owner of the property.
