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SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A Senate Joint Resolution concerning

Freedom for Cuba (Viva Cuba Libre)

FOR the purpose of expressing certain support for the Cuban people and democratic and economic transition in Cuba; calling on the United States and other democratic nations to assist the Cuban people; resolving that the Cuban Regime should abide by the Cuban Democracy Act passed by the United States Congress; resolving that the President of the United States and the United States Congress should maintain current U.S. economic and foreign policy toward Cuba under certain circumstances; expressing certain support for the "Compact with the People of Cuba"; and generally relating to Cuba.

WHEREAS, Since 1959, when Fidel Castro became the dictator of Cuba, Mr.
Castro has appointed himself Prime Minister, President of the Council of State,
President of the Council of Ministers, and First Secretary of the Communist Party of
Cuba; and

WHEREAS, Fidel Castro will remain head of the Communist Party of Cuba; and

WHEREAS, Regardless of whether Cuba's dictator is Fulgencio Batista, Fidel Castro, or Raul Castro, the goal of U.S. policy towards Cuba, and the focus of the international community toward Cuba, must remain the unconditional release of all political prisoners, the respect and recognition of fundamental human rights, and a transition to political freedom and democracy for the Cuban people; and

WHEREAS, When, on February 19, 2008, Fidel Castro announced his decision not to seek another term as Cuba's Commander—in—Chief or President, he noted that his decision was not a farewell and that his "only wish is to fight as a soldier in the battle of ideas"; and

WHEREAS, While Fidel Castro's resignation presents an opportunity for a democratic transition, indications suggest that the regime may seek to implement a succession plan that offers no quarter for such a transition; and



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$1\\2\\3$	WHEREAS, The regime could instead attempt to maintain Cuba's totalitarian government with only a few minor cosmetic changes to create the appearance of a real change; and		
4 5	WHEREAS, Observers have doubted Raul Castro's commitment to political reforms beyond minor structural adjustments to bolster Cuba's economy; and		
6 7	WHEREAS, Fidel Castro's resignation changes the face of Cuba's dictator, but does not change the dictatorship; and		
8 9 10	WHEREAS, Cuba has an opportunity to consolidate an authoritarian succession, or to try to lead its people toward a free, just, and prosperous state; now therefore, be it		
11 12 13 14	RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That this State stands in solidarity with the Cuban people and believes that now is the time for the Cuban people to be given the opportunity to choose how they will be governed and who will do the governing; and be it further		
15 16	RESOLVED, That this State remains ready to assist the Cuban people and calls on the United States and other democratic nations to do the same; and be it further		
17 18	RESOLVED, That the Cuban Regime should abide by the Cuban Democracy Act passed by the United States Congress; and be it further		
19 20 21 22	RESOLVED, That the President of the United States and the United States Congress should not change current U.S. economic or foreign policy toward Cuba until the Cuban government begins to demonstrate a resolve to reintegrate Cuba into the democratic mainstream of the Americas by:
