FISCAL AND POLICY NOTE

Senate Bill 507 Budget and Taxation (Senator Rosapepe)

State Aid for Police Protection - Grants

This bill alters the calculation of the State Aid for Police Protection Fund (police aid formula) by providing a supplemental grant of \$20 per capita to any municipality that contains a higher education institution with a full-time undergraduate enrollment of at least 20,000 students on its principal campus. In order to receive the supplemental grant, a municipality must provide matching funds for police protection.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: General fund expenditures would increase by \$548,200 in FY 2009. Future year expenditures reflect population increases for the City of College Park. Revenues would not be affected.

Local Effect: State aid to the City of College Park would increase by \$548,200 in FY 2009 and by \$559,200 in FY 2013. City expenditures for police protection would increase by the same amount.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: Additional State funding under the police aid formula is not provided to a municipality containing a higher education institution.

Legislation enacted in 2006 requires the State to provide a supplemental grant to subdivisions bordering the District of Columbia (Montgomery and Prince George's counties) by an amount equal to \$0.50 for each person living in Maryland within one mile of the border between Maryland and the District of Columbia.

Background: State grants are provided to counties and qualifying municipalities for the exclusive purpose of providing adequate police protection under the State Aid for Police Protection Fund, which was established in 1967. The program is commonly known as the police aid formula. In fiscal 2009, State funding for this program will total \$66.4 million. Exhibit 1 shows the fiscal 2009 total State Aid for Police Protection distribution by county.

Local governments spent approximately \$1.1 billion on police protection in fiscal 2004. County governments accounted for 62.3% of these expenditures, Baltimore City accounted for 25.8%, and municipal governments accounted for 11.9%. Baltimore City was excluded from the police aid formula beginning in fiscal 1992 when the State assumed the responsibility of operating and funding the Baltimore City Detention Center. In fiscal 1995, the State established a central booking facility for the city. The proposed fiscal 2009 State budget includes \$138.5 million in State funding for the Baltimore City Detention Center and Central Booking Facility. Legislation was enacted that enables Baltimore City to receive a \$0.50 per capita grant for police aid beginning in fiscal 1997.

State Fiscal Effect: The only qualifying municipality in the State that contains an institution of higher education with a full-time enrollment of at least 20,000 students on its principal campus is the City of College Park. It is estimated that there are 23,780 full-time undergraduate students enrolled at the University of Maryland, College Park (UMCP). The City of College Park has a population of 27,410. City expenditures for police protection are budgeted at \$550,000 in fiscal 2008, of which \$75,000 comes from the police aid formula.

State expenditures for police aid would increase by \$548,200 in fiscal 2009 and by \$559,200 in fiscal 2013. This estimate assumes a 0.5% annual increase in the city's population and that the city continues to provide matching funds.

Local Fiscal Effect: City of College Park revenues from the police aid formula would increase by \$548,200 in fiscal 2009 and could increase by \$559,200 in fiscal 2013.

Expenditures for police protection would increase by the same amount to provide matching funds. The City of College Park advises that the additional expenditures in police protection would be used to increase the number of full-time police officers employed by the city.
