- WHEREAS, When there are extraordinary fiscal times, it is particularly important for State government to make the most efficient use of resources; and
- WHEREAS, There are evidence-based practices that can improve the effectiveness of State government at no short-term cost and with long-term savings; now, therefore,
- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

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- 2 (c) (1) Except as otherwise provided in this subtitle, with its annual budget submission to the Department, an agency shall develop and submit to the Department as part of the budget process a managing for results agency strategic plan
- 5 that shall include:
- 6 [(1)] (I) a mission statement;
- 7 [(2)] (II) a description of the agency's goals;
- 8 [(3)] (III) a description of the objectives and performance measures 9 implemented at the program level to achieve the agency's goals, including:
- 10 [(i)] **1.** performance measure statistics for at least the 2 most 11 recently completed fiscal years; and
- 12 [(ii)] **2.** performance measure estimates for the current year appropriation and budget request year;
- [(4)] (IV) a discussion of the agency's progress in meeting its goals and performance measures and any challenges the agency has faced in working toward its goals;
- [(5)] **(V)** a description of the internal controls established to ensure reliability of the data collected for each performance measure; and
- [(6)] **(VI)** an identification of the customers and stakeholders served.
