CHAPTER

1 AN ACT concerning

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Voter's Rights Protection Act of 2009

FOR the purpose of altering the circumstances under which an individual may be offered the opportunity to cast a provisional ballot; requiring the State Board of Elections to ensure that the program of instruction for election judges incorporates a thorough and detailed treatment of certain information; requiring a local board to extend the hours that a polling place shall be open under certain circumstances; prohibiting a vacancy in polling place staff from delaying the opening of the polling place; prohibiting an election judge from requiring a voter to present photo identification before voting, except as authorized by State or federal law; requiring certain election judges to document for further investigation any malfunction of the voting system and other issues that arise during the course of an election; regulating the activities of challengers or watchers at the polling place; prohibiting certain persons from distributing, disseminating, or publishing, or being responsible for certain activities, with respect to any item of campaign material that contains certain fraudulent representations or implications; prohibiting the use of electronic mail or telephone facilities or equipment with the intent to prevent, obstruct, or delay the broadcast or exchange of certain registration information or the registration of a person having a lawful right to register; prohibiting the use of electronic mail or telephone facilities or equipment with the intent to prevent, obstruct, or delay the broadcast or exchange of election-related information, or the use of a telecommunications device to engage in certain communication; making conforming changes; defining certain terms; prohibiting certain election
