vehicle lawfully using an audible signal, the driver of every other vehicle, unless otherwise directed by a police officer, shall drive immediately to a position parallel to and as close as possible to the edge or curb of the roadway, clear of any intersection.

- (c) On the immediate approach of an emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22–218 of this article or of a police vehicle lawfully using an audible signal, the driver of every other vehicle, unless otherwise directed by a police officer, shall stop and stay in this position until the emergency vehicle has passed.
- 9 (d) A driver, when proceeding in the same direction as an emergency or police vehicle, may not pass an emergency vehicle using audible and visual signals that meet the requirements of § 22–218 of this article or a police vehicle lawfully using an audible signal unless:
 - (1) The emergency vehicle has stopped; or
- 14 (2) Otherwise directed by a police officer.
- 15 (e) This section does not relieve the driver of an emergency vehicle from the duty to drive with due regard for the safety of all persons.

- 18 (a) It is a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of the 19 Maryland Vehicle Law unless the violation:
- 20 (1) Is declared to be a felony by the Maryland Vehicle Law or by any 21 other law of this State; or
- 22 (2) Is punishable by a civil penalty under the applicable provision of 23 the Maryland Vehicle Law.
 - (b) Except as otherwise provided in this section, any person convicted of a misdemeanor for the violation of any of the provisions of the Maryland Vehicle Law is subject to a fine of not more than \$500.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2009.
