2 Election Law - Voting Systems - Requirements

3	FOR the purpose of authorizing the State Board of Elections to certify a voting system
4	that has been examined by an independent testing laboratory approved by the
5	National Association of State Election Directors; requiring the State Board to
6	select and certify the voting system that best satisfies certain requirements if at
7	the time of procurement of a voting system there are no voting systems
8	commercially available that entirely satisfy certain requirements; making this
9	Act an emergency measure; and generally relating to the selection and
10	certification of voting systems.

- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

- 20 (a) In this section, a "voter-verifiable paper record" includes:
- 21 (1) a paper ballot prepared by the voter for the purpose of being read 22 by a precinct—based optical scanner;
- 23 (2) a paper ballot prepared by the voter to be mailed to the applicable local board, whether mailed from a domestic or an overseas location; and

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1 standards adopted as part of the Voluntary Voting System Guidelines pursuant to the $\mathbf{2}$ Help America Vote Act. 3 At least one voting system in each polling place on election day **(1)** 4 shall provide access for voters with disabilities in compliance with subsection (f) of this 5 section. The State Board shall ensure that adequate backup equipment is 6 (2)7 available and contingency plans are established to ensure compliance with paragraph 8 (1) of this subsection. 9 (h) Before the selection of a voting system, the State Board shall: 10 ensure that an accessible voting system conforms to the access (1) requirements of the Voluntary Voting System Guidelines developed in accordance with 11 the Help America Vote Act in effect at the time of selection; and 12 13 (2)conduct an accessibility and usability evaluation of the voting system to assess its accessibility and usability by voters with disabilities, including: 14 15 (i) a public demonstration of the system; and 16 an evaluation by individuals representing a cross-section of 17 voters with disabilities. 18 (i) (1) The State Board shall adopt regulations relating to requirements for each voting system selected and certified under § 9–101 of this subtitle. 19 20 (2)The regulations shall specify the procedures necessary to assure that the standards of this title are maintained, including: 21 22 (i) a description of the voting system; 23a public information program by the local board, at the time of introduction of a new voting system, to be directed to all voters, candidates, 24 25 campaign groups, schools, and news media in the county; 26 local election officials' responsibility for management of the (iii) 27system; 28 the actions required to assure the security of the voting (iv) 29 system; the supplies and equipment required; 30 (v) 31 the storage, delivery, and return of the supplies and (vi) 32 equipment necessary for the operation of the voting system;

3 4 5 6	(viii) before each election and for all ballot styles to be used, testing by the members of the local board to ensure the accuracy of tallying, tabulation, and reporting of the vote, and observing of that testing by representatives of political parties and of candidates who are not affiliated with political parties;
7 8 9	(ix) the number of voting stations or voting booths required in each polling place, in relation to the number of registered voters assigned to the polling place;
10 11	(x) the practices and procedures in each polling place appropriate to the operation of the voting system;
12 13	(xi) assuring ballot accountability in systems using a document ballot;
14	(xii) the actions required to tabulate votes; and
15	(xiii) postelection review and audit of the system's output.
16 17	(3) Certification of a voting system is not effective until the regulations applicable to the voting system have been adopted.
18 19 20 21 22 23 24	(J) NOTWITHSTANDING THE REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTIONS (F)(3) AND (H)(1) OF THIS SECTION, IF AT THE TIME OF PROCUREMENT OF A VOTING SYSTEM THERE ARE NO VOTING SYSTEMS COMMERCIALLY AVAILABLE THAT SATISFY THE REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTIONS (F)(3) AND (H)(1) OF THIS SECTION, THE STATE BOARD SHALL SELECT AND CERTIFY THE VOTING SYSTEM THAT BEST SATISFIES THE REQUIREMENTS OF SUBSECTIONS (F)(3) AND (H)(1) OF THIS SECTION.

AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act is an emergency measure, is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health or safety, has been passed by a yea and nay vote supported by three–fifths of all the members elected to each of the two Houses of the General Assembly, and shall take effect from

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the date it is enacted.
