# 1 AN ACT concerning

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# Maryland Veterans Behavioral Health – Expansion

FOR the purpose of expanding behavioral health coordination to certain additional veterans who served on active duty in the uniformed services of the United States; requiring the provision of certain behavioral health services under certain circumstances in certain additional areas of the State; and generally relating to the provision of behavioral health services for veterans in the State.

13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF 14 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

# 15 Article – Health – General

- 16 13–2701.
- 17 (a) In this subtitle the following words have the meanings indicated.

1 (b) "Adjutant General" means the head of the Maryland Military 2 Department.

3 (c) "Behavioral health services" means mental health services or alcohol and 4 substance abuse services.

5 (d) "Crisis services" means temporary services designed to address and 6 stabilize a severe behavioral health problem and to avoid an emergency situation, and 7 may include hotlines, in-home support, and residential crisis services.

8 (e) "Maryland Defense Force" means the military force established under §
9 13–501 of the Public Safety Article.

(f) "Maryland National Guard" means the Maryland Army National Guard
 and Maryland Air National Guard.

(g) "Service coordination" means a service designed to coordinate and provide
 assistance in obtaining access to behavioral health services.

14 (h) "Service coordinator" means a person employed by the Department to 15 provide service coordination to veterans.

- 16 (i) "Uniformed services" has the meaning stated in 10 U.S.C. § 101.
- 17 (j) "Veteran" means a Maryland resident who[:

18 (1) Served] **SERVED** on active duty in the uniformed services of the 19 United States, other than for training, and was discharged or released under 20 conditions other than dishonorable[; and

(2) (i) Served in Afghanistan or contiguous airspace, as defined in
 federal regulations, on or after October 24, 2001, and before a terminal date to be
 prescribed by the United States Secretary of Defense; or

(ii) Served in Iraq or contiguous waters or airspace, as defined
in federal regulations, on or after March 19, 2003, and before a terminal date to be
prescribed by the United States Secretary of Defense].

(k) "Web-based resource program" means an interactive web-based
 communication medium that:

(1) Allows individuals to access comprehensive information, advocacy,
 and other resources regarding public and private behavioral health services, crisis and
 emergency services, and early intervention and prevention programs; and

1 (2) Enables the public and private health care communities to work 2 together to address the problems related to providing and obtaining access to 3 behavioral health services.

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(a) Subject to the limitations of its budget, the Department:

6 (1) In collaboration with the United States Department of Veterans 7 Affairs, the Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs, the Maryland National Guard, 8 and the Maryland Defense Force, shall provide service coordination for veterans in all 9 geographic regions of the State to connect them to behavioral health services which 10 may be available through the United States Department of Veterans Affairs;

11 (2) (i) Where services are not yet available or accessible through 12 the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, shall provide service coordination 13 for veterans in all geographic regions of the State to connect them to behavioral health 14 services which may be available through the Mental Hygiene Administration or the 15 Alcohol and Drug Abuse Administration, until such federal services can be accessed 16 and obtained; and

(ii) The provision of services through the Mental Hygiene
Administration or the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Administration shall be based on
eligibility and medical necessity criteria established by these administrations; and

20 (3) Shall provide veterans up-to-date information about behavioral 21 health services and resources through a web-based resource program.

(b) Subject to the limitations of its budget and in addition to the service
coordination provided under subsection (a) of this section, the Department shall
provide or fund certain behavioral health services for veterans who:

(1) Meet the eligibility and medical necessity criteria of the Mental
 Hygiene Administration and the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Administration; and

(2) Cannot obtain immediate access to behavioral health services
 through the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.

29 (c) (1) The behavioral health services provided under subsection (b) of 30 this section may include:

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(i) Crisis services in all geographic regions of the State; and

32 (ii) Short-term behavioral health services [in rural areas of the
33 State], where existing federal and State behavioral health services are determined by
34 the Department to be inadequate or inaccessible.
