# 1 AN ACT concerning

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# **Maryland Environmental Service – Energy Generation Projects**

3 FOR the purpose of authorizing the Maryland Environmental Service to engage in 4 certain energy projects and services; clarifying the authority of the Service to 5 provide recycling and certain other projects; altering certain exemptions for the 6 Service from certain provisions relating to finance and procurement; 7 authorizing counties and municipalities to enter into certain agreements with 8 the Service without regard to certain limitations or other provisions regulating 9 the procurement or awarding of public contracts; confirming the authority of the Service to establish and collect rates, fees, and charges for certain projects, 10 products, and services; authorizing the Service to collect certain unpaid rates, 11 fees, and charges by tax sale; altering the authority of the Service to issue 12 13 certain bonds and notes; authorizing counties and municipalities to enter into certain agreements with the Service for energy projects; clarifying the 14 jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission over disputes regarding certain 15rates, fees, and other charges exacted by the Service; altering certain notice 16 requirements; altering certain reporting requirements of the Service; altering 17 certain definitions; defining a certain term; and generally relating to the 18 19 Maryland Environmental Service.

Service districts may encompass areas containing projects of the Service as well as nonduplicating, noncompetitive projects owned and operated by

9 municipalities or persons. Service districts shall be based upon approved State-county 10 master water and sewerage plans or solid waste disposal plans, if any, adopted 11 pursuant to the Environment Article, but they may also take account of other plans 12 and studies.

 disposal [through the production of], RECOVERY, OR REUSE TO PRODUCE energy or

[(q)] (R) "Solid wastes" means all waste materials, whether solid, liquid, or gas, including liquid wastes. The term includes garbage, rubbish, ashes, incinerator residue, wastewater treatment residue, street cleanings, dredged materials, dead animals, demolition and construction debris, household appliances, HAZARDOUS MATERIALS, automobile bodies, offal, paunch manure, methane or any other gases, sewage sludge and solid or gaseous waste materials from [individual,] commercial, agricultural, RESIDENTIAL, industrial, or community activities.

[(r)] (S) "Wastewater purification project" means any service, facility, or
 property, real or personal, used or useful or having present capacity for future use in
 connection with the MEASUREMENT, MANAGEMENT, PREVENTION, REDIRECTION,
 [collection] COLLECTION, or treatment of liquid wastes.

1 [(s)] (T) "Water supply project" means any service, facility, or property, real 2 or personal, used, useful, or having present capacity for future use in connection with 3 water supply, **PROTECTION**, and distribution, including any water treatment facility 4 or property and rights therein and appurtenances thereto.

6 To assist with the preservation, improvement, and management of the (a) 7 quality of air, land, [and] water, AND NATURAL resources, and to promote the health 8 and welfare of the citizens of the State, it is the intention of the General Assembly in 9 enactment of this subtitle to provide for dependable, effective, and efficient water supply and purification and disposal of liquid and solid wastes, to encourage 10 reductions in the amount of waste generated and discharged to the environment and 11 12the generation of energy and the recovery of useable resources from such waste to the 13extent practicable; TO PROMOTE THE CONSERVATION OF ENERGY USAGE AND TO 14 ENABLE AND PROVIDE FOR THE PRODUCTION OF ENERGY FROM SOLID WASTES 15AND RENEWABLE AND OTHER SOURCES; to encourage private sector participation in environmental protection; and to serve its political subdivisions and economic 16 17interests. 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#### **SENATE BILL 14**

1 (a) The Service has all powers necessary for carrying out the purposes of this 2 subtitle, including the following rights and powers set forth in this section.

3 (b) To have perpetual existence as a corporation.

4 (c) To adopt bylaws, rules, regulations, policies, and procedures for the 5 regulation of its affairs and conduct of its business.

- 6 (d) To adopt an official seal and alter it.
- 7 (e) To maintain one or more offices at a place or places it chooses.

8 (f) To appoint agents and employees, to prescribe their duties, and fix their 9 compensation as set forth in this subtitle.

10 (g) To sue and be sued.

(h) To acquire, construct, reconstruct, rehabilitate, improve, maintain, lease as lessor or as lessee, repair and operate projects within or without the State. The Service shall establish reasonable rules and regulations for the use of any project. It may acquire, purchase, hold, lease as lessee, and use any franchise and any property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible, or any interest therein necessary to carry out the purposes of the Service. It may sell, lease as lessor, transfer, and dispose of any property or interest in it that it has acquired.

18 To acquire by gift, purchase, or the exercise of the right of eminent (i) 19 domain in the manner prescribed by law lands, structures, real or personal property 20rights, rights-of-way, franchises, easements, and other interests in lands, including 21lands lying underwater and riparian rights which are located within and without the 22State as it considers necessary or convenient for the construction or operation of a 23project, upon terms and at prices considered by the Service to be reasonable and can 24be agreed upon by the Service and the owner of the interest, and to take title to the 25interest in the name of the Service. At any time ten days after the return and 26 recordation of the verdict or award in any condemnation proceeding, the Service may 27take possession of the property condemned, upon paying to the clerk of the court the 28amount of the award and all costs taxed to that date, notwithstanding any appeal or 29 further proceeding by defendant. At the time of the payment, the Service shall give its 30 corporate undertaking to abide by any judgment in any appeal or further proceedings.

31(j) To borrow money and issue bonds or notes for the purpose of paying all or 32any part of the cost of any one or more projects or for any other purpose of the Service; 33 to provide funds to be paid into any debt service reserve fund; to secure the payment of 34the bonds or notes or any part thereof by pledge or deed of trust of all or any part of its 35 revenues or other available money or by pledge, mortgage, or deed of trust of any one 36 or more facilities or properties; to combine projects for financing purposes and to make 37 agreements with or for the benefit of the purchaser or holder of the bonds or notes, 38 with the issue of the bonds or notes, whether issued or to be issued, as the Service may

1 deem advisable; and in general to provide for the security of the bonds or notes and the 2 rights of their holders.

3 (k) To combine, after consultation with the municipalities affected, one or 4 more water supply, wastewater purification, [or] solid waste disposal, OR ENERGY 5 project with any other project as a single system for the purpose of operation or 6 financing.

7 (1) To fix, alter, charge, and collect rates, fees, and charges for the use of or
8 for the services, PRODUCTS, OR ENERGY furnished OR PRODUCED by [its projects]
9 THE SERVICE.

10 (m)To enter into contracts with the federal or any state government, or any 11 unit, instrumentality, or subdivision thereof, or with any municipality or person 12within or without the State, providing for or relating to the furnishing of services to or 13 the facilities of any project of the Service, or in connection with the services or 14 facilities provided by any water supply project, solid waste project, [or] wastewater 15purification project, OR ENERGY PROJECT owned or controlled by the other 16 contracting party, including contracts for the construction and operation of any project 17in the State or in any other state. These contracts may make provision for:

- 18 (1) The payment by the other contracting party to the Service of a 19 fixed amount for the collection, processing, treatment, storage, transporting, **USE**, or 20 disposal of a stated amount of solid waste (whether or not the stated amount of solid 21 waste is collected, processed, treated, stored, transported, or disposed of), or of all or 22 any portion of the operating expenses of one or more projects;
- (2) The utilization by the other contracting party of one or more
   projects for the processing, treatment, storage, transporting, USE, or disposal of all or
   any portion of solid waste over which such party has control;
- 26 (3) The collection by the other contracting party or its agents or by 27 agents of the Service of fees, rates, or charges for the services and facilities rendered to 28 a municipality or its inhabitants, and for the enforcement of delinquent charges for 29 such services and facilities; or
- 30 (4) The abandonment, restriction, or prohibition of the construction or 31 operation of competing facilities. The provisions of any contract with a municipality 32 shall be deemed to be for the benefit of bondholders or noteholders as designated by 33 the Service and may be made irrevocable so long as any bonds or notes of the Service 34 secured by such contract are outstanding.

35 (n) (1) To make any contract or agreement the Service determines to be 36 necessary or incidental to the performance of its duties and to the execution of the 37 purpose of and the powers granted by this subtitle, including contracts with the 38 federal or any state government, or any unit, instrumentality, or municipality thereof, 39 or with any person, on terms and condition the Service approves.

The Service may make contracts or agreements relating to:

The use by the other contracting party or the inhabitants of (i) any municipality of any project acquired, constructed, reconstructed, rehabilitated, improved, or extended by the Service under this subtitle or the services therefrom or the facilities thereof; (ii)The use by the Service of the services or facilities of any water supply system or project, solid waste system or project, or liquid waste system or project, not owned or operated by the Service; (iii) The sale of any fuel, steam, electricity, energy, WASTE **PRODUCT**, or other material or resource derived from the operation of any project; (iv) The acceptance, processing, treatment, USE, and disposal of solid wastes by one or more projects; or The employment or retention of consulting and other (**v**) engineers, superintendents, financial advisors, attorneys, accountants, and other employees, advisors, or agents as in the judgment of the Service are necessary or desirable. (3)The contracts and agreements of the Service may provide for the

17 (3) The contracts and agreements of the Service may provide for the 18 collecting of fees, rates, or charges for the projects provided by the Service and for the 19 enforcement of delinquent charges for the projects. The provisions of any contract or 20 agreement of the Service, and of any ordinance or resolution of the governing body of a 21 municipality enacted pursuant thereto, shall be deemed to be for the benefit of 22 bondholders or noteholders.

23 $(\mathbf{0})$ To enter upon and excavate any municipal street, road, alley, highway, or 24any other public way for the purpose of installing, maintaining, and operating a water 25supply, solid waste disposal, [or] wastewater purification, OR ENERGY project 26provided for under this subtitle. The Service may construct, reconstruct, rehabilitate,  $\mathbf{27}$ or extend in the street, road, alley, or highway, a water supply facility, sewer or storm  $\mathbf{28}$ drain, ENERGY TRANSMISSION FACILITY, or any appurtenance thereof, without a 29 permit or the payment of a charge subject, however, to reasonable regulation 30 established by the governing body of any municipality having jurisdiction in the particular respect. If any municipal street, road, alley, or highway is to be disturbed, 31 32the governing body shall be notified within a reasonable period of time, and the street, road, alley, or highway shall be repaired and left by the Service in the same condition 33 as, or in a condition not inferior to, that existing before the street, road, alley, or 3435 highway was torn up. The Service shall bear every incidental cost.

(p) To enter upon lands, waters, or premises as is necessary or desirable for
the purposes of making surveys, soundings, borings, and examinations to accomplish
any purpose authorized by this subtitle. The Service is liable for actual damage done.

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1 To make application for, receive, and accept from any state or federal (**q**)  $\mathbf{2}$ government, or any unit, instrumentality, or subdivision thereof, grants for or in aid of 3 the planning, financing, construction, acquisition, maintenance, or operation of any 4 project, and to receive and accept aid or contributions from any source of money,  $\mathbf{5}$ property, labor, or other things of value, to be held, used, and applied only for the 6 purpose for which the grants and contributions are made in the furtherance of the  $\mathbf{7}$ purposes of this subtitle. In those cases involving federal and State grants, including, 8 but not limited to, grants administered by the Department of the Environment for the 9 collection and treatment of sewage and industrial wastes under the Sanitary Facilities Fund, in Title 9 of the Environment Article, the Service shall be eligible the same as a 10 11 municipality.

12 To make directly, or through the hiring of consultants, any plans,  $(\mathbf{r})$ surveys, investigations, and studies relating to water supply, liquid and solid wastes 13 14 transportation, purification, disposal techniques, recycling, ENERGY PRODUCTION 15AND TRANSMISSION, CONSERVATION OF RESOURCES, and management methods 16 or the effects of these techniques, and methods, in order to improve or evaluate the 17effectiveness or economy of its services and operations. The Service may charge in 18 whole or in part the costs of the investigations and studies against one or more 19 projects or Service districts, or it may include them in whole or in part in its general 20operating expenses depending on the expected applicability of the studies and 21investigations. The Service may supplement grants or other aids received from the 22federal government or from other sources to assist in carrying out the purposes of this 23subtitle. Consultants hired under this subsection may not be deemed to be providing 24architectural or engineering services as those terms are defined in § 11–101 of the 25State Finance and Procurement Article.

26 (s) To conduct hearings and investigations for the furtherance of the 27 purposes of this subtitle.

28To take and hold title to any project that may be transferred to the (t)29 Service, and to assume jurisdiction over and provide for the maintenance and 30 operation of the project, all on such terms as may be mutually agreed upon between 31the Service and the transferor. The Service may contract with any municipality to 32assume the payment of the principal of and interest on obligations or indebtedness of 33 such municipality incurred in connection with any project and may undertake to 34operate any project in such a manner as to provide for the payment of all outstanding 35obligations or indebtedness applicable to the project and the interest thereon and to transfer to the appropriate municipality an amount equal to the debt service payments 36 37 prior to the applicable payment date. Subject to the approval of the Board of Public 38 Works, the State may lease, lend, grant, or otherwise convey to the Service any 39 property that is necessary for the purposes of this subtitle.

40 (u) To do all things necessary to carry out its purposes and for the exercise of 41 the powers granted in this subtitle.

1 (v) Except as provided in §§ 3–109 and 3–110 of this subtitle, the Service 2 does not have any power to construct, establish, or operate any new solid waste 3 disposal project within the boundaries of any county or municipal corporation without 4 the express consent of the governing body of the county or municipal corporation.

 $\mathbf{5}$ To permit a municipality to construct, operate, maintain, expand, (w) 6 relocate, replace, renovate, or repair facilities provided for in this subtitle when the  $\mathbf{7}$ Service certifies that it is not in a position to provide the necessary construction, operation, maintenance, expansion, relocation, replacement, renovation, or repair of 8 9 facilities within the municipality. Notwithstanding other provisions in this subtitle and limited to the circumstances in this subsection, a municipality shall finance 10 construction, operation, maintenance, expansion, relocation, replacement, renovation, 11 12or repair of facilities in accordance with its statutory authority, including the receiving of State and federal grants if available. The municipality may construct, operate, 13 14 maintain, expand, relocate, replace, renovate, or repair these facilities.

15 (x) In making plans, surveys, studies, and investigations under this subtitle, 16 the Service shall include in its findings its statement of the impact that a project may 17 have on the site on which the project is to be located if that site has cultural, historic, 18 or social significance.

19 (y) To create, with the approval of the Board, private corporations for 20 purposes consistent with this subtitle.

(z) To exercise all the corporate powers granted Maryland corporations
 under the Maryland General Corporation Law.

23 3–105.

(a) The Service is responsible for carrying out the following general activities
subject to the limitations stated in this section.

(b) Planning, integrating, and establishing geographic service regions and
districts, in cooperation with affected municipalities and based upon approved
State-county master plans for water and sewerage, and solid waste disposal as
provided in the Environment Article, as well as other plans and studies permitted by
this subtitle.

and repair of a water supply project, wastewater purification project, and solid waste disposal project, pursuant to an order of the Secretary of the Environment as further provided in §§ 3–109 and 3–110 of this subtitle; or pursuant to a mandatory agreement to provide requested services, as provided in § 3–107 of this subtitle; or pursuant to an approved five-year plan, as provided in § 3–106 of this subtitle.

6 Except upon request of a municipality and pursuant to a contract (e)  $\mathbf{7}$ between the Service and the municipality, the Service may not acquire, construct, operate, or establish a wastewater purification project or solid waste disposal project, 8 9 as the case may be, for (1) any area or district which, in the determination of the Secretary of the Environment, is receiving adequate service from a project owned by a 10 municipality and operated in compliance with applicable laws and regulations; (2) any 11 12area or district which, in the determination of that Secretary, will receive, within a reasonable time, adequate service from a project owned by a municipality and 13 14 operated in compliance with applicable laws and regulations; or (3) dredging or 15dredged material disposal projects.

16 (f) Execute the powers and perform the duties set forth in Title 7, Subtitle 4 17 of the Environment Article, including the financing, acquisition, leasing, and operation 18 of hazardous waste disposal facilities.

(a) Any municipality or person may request the Service to provide the water
 supply, wastewater [purification or] PURIFICATION, solid waste disposal, OR
 ENERGY projects, OR ANY OTHER SERVICES, authorized by this subtitle. The request
 shall set forth the type of proposed project OR SERVICES to be furnished and the
 proposed boundaries of the area within which a project [is] OR SERVICES ARE
 requested.

26NOTWITHSTANDING ANY LIMITATIONS OR OTHER PROVISIONS TO (b) 27THE CONTRARY OF ARTICLE 23A, ARTICLE 25A, OR ARTICLE 25B OF THE 28CODE, OR OF ANY CHARTER OR LOCAL LAW REGULATING THE PROCUREMENT 29OR AWARDING OF PUBLIC CONTRACTS, A MUNICIPALITY MAY ENTER INTO 30 CONTRACTS WITH THE SERVICE FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE SERVICE 31PROVIDING ANY OF THE PROJECTS OR SERVICES REQUESTED BY THE 32MUNICIPALITY. As soon as possible after receipt of a duly authorized request from a 33 municipality or person, the Service shall draft a proposed contract with the municipality or person in accordance with the provisions of this subtitle specifying the 3435 type of project **OR SERVICES** to be provided, whether or not a service district will be 36 established, the boundaries and effective date of any service district, and the terms, 37 conditions, and costs under which the project OR SERVICES will be provided. Upon execution of the contract, the Service as soon as possible shall establish any service 38 39 district provided for in the contract and provide, maintain, and operate the necessary 40 project.  services or in determining the costs to be levied against a municipality, person, or

 require that the charges reflect the full costs of [projects] PROVIDING THE

10 (a) If any officer whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature appears 11 on any bonds [or coupons] or notes ceases to be the officer before the delivery of the 12 bonds or notes, the signature or facsimile is nevertheless valid and sufficient for all 13 purposes as if he had remained in office until delivery.

14 (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this title or any recitals in any 15 bonds and notes issued hereunder, all bonds and notes shall be deemed to be 16 negotiable instruments under the laws of the State.

The Service, by resolution adopted by a majority of the Board, may:

34 (1) Issue, prior to the preparation of definitive bonds, interim receipts
35 or temporary bonds[, with or without coupons,] exchangeable for definitive bonds

The issuance of 8 [bond anticipation] notes and the details thereof, the rights of the holders, and the 9 rights, duties, and obligations of the Service in respect thereto, are governed by the 10 provisions of this title relating to bonds, insofar as these provisions may be applicable. A grant anticipation note may be issued or sold only after receipt of written 11 commitment of the federal or State government or agency making the grant; and 12

13 (3) Issue and sell its revenue bonds or notes [in the nature of 14 industrial development bonds, whether the bonds or notes be pollution control revenue 15 bonds, solid waste disposal revenue bonds, or other types of industrial development 16 revenue bonds,] for the purpose of borrowing money to lend to any person or 17 municipality for the accomplishment by such person or municipality of a project or 18 projects. The principal of and interest on the bonds or notes may be made payable out 19 of:

20 (i) The revenues received by the Service from such person or

24(iii) Any other sources designated by the Service. The 25authorizing resolution may make provision for the issuance of such bonds or notes in 26series as funds are required. The issuance of bonds or notes and the details of the 27issuance, the rights of the holders of the bonds or notes, and the rights, duties, and 28obligations of the Service of the bonds and notes shall be governed by the provisions of 29 this subtitle relating to bonds insofar as those provisions are applicable. 1 Bonds and notes authorized to be issued under the provisions of this (a)  $\mathbf{2}$ subtitle by resolution of the Board may be secured by a trust agreement by and 3 between the Service and a corporate trustee, which may be any trust company, or 4 bank having trust powers, within or without the State. The trust agreement, or the  $\mathbf{5}$ authorizing resolution, may pledge or assign all or any part of the revenues of the 6 Service or of any project or other available funds of the Service or pledge, convey, or  $\mathbf{7}$ assign any one or more facilities or properties. The trust agreement may set forth the 19 rights and remedies of the bondholders and of the trustee] and may restrict the 20individual right of action by bondholders. 34The Service may fix, revise, charge, and collect rentals, rates, fees or (a) 35 other charges for the use of or for the services **OR PRODUCTS** furnished by any project 36 or projects, including projects within a service district, contract with any person or 37municipality desiring the use of the services **OR PRODUCTS**, or any part of any project 38 or projects, and fix the terms, conditions, rentals, rates, fees, and charges therefor. The 39 rentals and other rates, fees and charges designated as security for any bonds or notes issued under this subtitle shall be fixed and adjusted in respect of the aggregate 40 thereof from the projects under the control of the Service as to provide funds sufficient 41 42with other revenues, if any, (1) to pay the cost of maintaining, repairing, and operating 43any project or projects financed in whole or in part by outstanding bonds or notes, to the extent the cost is not otherwise provided, (2) to pay the principal of and the 44

The rentals, rates, fees, and charges are not subject to supervision or regulation by any unit of the State government or any political subdivision, except as provided in § 3–128 of this subtitle.

7 (b) The rentals, rates, fees, and other charges and revenues, or any part 8 thereof, whether derived from the project or projects in connection with which the 9 bonds or notes of any issue have been issued or from other projects, designated as 10 security for the bonds or notes by the authorizing resolution or in the trust agreement 11 securing the bonds or notes, shall be set aside at the regular intervals provided in the 12resolution or trust agreement in a sinking fund pledged to, and charged with, the payment of (1) the interest on the bonds or notes as it falls due, (2) the principal of the 1314 bonds or notes as it falls due, (3) the necessary charges of [paying agents for paying 15principal and interest] THE TRUSTEE AND OTHER AGENTS APPOINTED BY THE 16 **TRUST AGREEMENT**, and (4) the redemption price or purchase price of bonds or notes 17retired by call or purchase as provided in the resolution or trust agreement. Neither the resolution nor any trust agreement by which a pledge 27is created need be filed or recorded except in the records of the Service, any public 28general or public local law to the contrary notwithstanding. The use and disposition of 29 money to the credit of the sinking fund are subject to the provisions of the resolution 30 authorizing the issuance of the bonds or notes or of the trust agreement.

32Any holder of bonds or notes issued under this subtitle [or of any of the coupons 33 thereto appertaining,] and the trustee, except to the extent the rights herein given 34may be restricted by the trust agreement, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, 35 mandamus or other proceedings, may protect and enforce any and all rights under the 36 laws of the State or granted hereunder, or in the resolution authorizing the issuance of 37the bonds or notes, or under the trust agreement, and may enforce and compel the 38 performance of all duties required by this subtitle, or in the resolution authorizing the 39 issuance of the bonds or notes, or by the trust agreement, to be performed by the 40 Service, or by any officer thereof, including the fixing, charging, and collecting of rentals and other rates, fees, and charges for the use of the projects. 41

Bonds or notes issued under the provisions of this subtitle shall not be 1 (a)  $\mathbf{2}$ deemed to constitute or create a debt or a pledge of the faith and credit of the State or 3 of any political subdivision. Every bond or note shall contain on its face a statement to 4 the effect that neither the Service, the State, nor any political subdivision thereof is  $\mathbf{5}$ obligated to pay it or the interest thereon except from revenues or other money of the 6 Service available therefor and that neither the faith and credit nor the taxing power of 7 the State or any political subdivision is pledged to the payment of the principal of or 8 the interest on the bonds or notes. For the purposes of this subsection, the express powers contained 28and enumerated in Articles 23A, 25A, and 25B of the Code and in the Charter of the 29 City of Baltimore are deemed to incorporate and include the power and authority 30 contained in this subsection.

(2) (i) A county or municipal corporation may limit its obligations
 under contracts with the Service to a specific source of funds including revenues of its

18 (vii) The county or municipal corporation may enter into a rate 19 covenant with the Service specifying the level of these rates and charges, the 20 covenants described in § 3–104(m) of this subtitle, and other covenants of the county 21 or municipal corporation to provide solid waste collection, treatment, or disposal 22 service and assure that sufficient revenues are available to provide for the payments 23 due under the contract.

(viii) The powers granted by this section are in addition to other powers of a county or municipal corporation granted under law and may not be restricted by any debt or tax rate limitation in any general law, local law, or charter provision.

(ix) Rates and charges imposed under this section are not
subject to the jurisdiction of any entity other than the Service or the contracting
municipality.

31 (3) Any contract between the Service and a municipality shall be valid,
32 binding, and enforceable against the municipality if it is approved by resolution of the
33 governing body of the municipality.

(4) A county or municipal corporation may exercise the powers
 granted under this section notwithstanding any limitations or other provisions to the
 contrary of Article 23A, Article 25A, or Article 25B of the Code or of any charter or

1 Service may provide for the creation, continuation, (a) The and  $\mathbf{2}$ administration of whatever funds may be required. Money in these funds and other 3 money of the Service shall be deposited, as directed by the Service, in any State or 4 national bank, or federally insured savings and loan associations having a total  $\mathbf{5}$ paid-in capital of at least \$1,000,000 or in any financial institution in which the State 6 Treasurer is authorized to deposit State funds. The trust department of any State or 7 national bank or savings and loan association may be designated as a depository to 8 receive any securities acquired or owned by the Service. The restriction with respect to 9 paid-in capital may be waived for any qualifying bank or savings and loan association 10 which agrees to pledge securities of the State or of the United States to protect the funds and securities of the Service in amounts and under arrangements acceptable to 11 the Service. 12

(b) Any money of the Service, in its discretion and unless otherwise provided
in any [agreement] TRUST AGREEMENT, OTHER AGREEMENT, or covenant
[between] MADE BY the Service [and] FOR THE BENEFIT OF the holders of any of its
obligations [limiting or restricting classes of investments,] WITH RESPECT TO FUNDS
HELD UNDER THE TRUST OR OTHER AGREEMENT may be invested in:

- 18 (1) Bonds or other obligations of, or guaranteed as to principal and
   19 interest by, the United States or the State or its political subdivisions or units; or
- 20 (2) Any other obligation or security in which the State Treasurer may 21 invest under § 6–222 of the State Finance and Procurement Article.
- (c) The Service shall make provision for a system of financial accounting, controls, audits, and reports. All accounting systems and records, auditing procedures and standards, and financial reporting shall conform to generally accepted principles of governmental accounting. The Service shall adopt the fiscal year of July 1 to June 30, designate the necessary funds for complete accountability, and specify the basis of accounting for each fund.

28As soon as practical after the closing of the fiscal year, an audit shall be (d) 29 made of the financial books, records, and accounts of the Service. The audit shall be 30 made by independent certified public accountants, selected by the Service and licensed 31to practice in the State. The accountants may not have a personal interest either 32directly or indirectly in the fiscal affairs of the Service. They shall be experienced and 33 qualified in the accounting and auditing of public bodies. The report of audit shall be 34prepared in accordance with generally accepted auditing principles and point out any 35 irregularities found to exist. 1 (e) The books, records, and accounts of the Service are subject to audit by the 2 State, including the Legislative Auditor.

3 (f) Any officer or employee who refuses to give the required assistance and 4 information to the accountants selected by the Service or by the State, or who refuses 5 to submit to them for examination the books, documents, records, files, accounts, 6 papers, things, or property required for the audit, in the discretion of the Service, may 7 be required to forfeit his office or employment.

8 (g) Any moneys received by the Service from State agencies for goods or 9 services provided by the Service in accordance with agreements with those agencies 10 shall be deposited and credited to the funds created under this subtitle.

11 (h) Within the first 90 days of each fiscal year, the Service shall make a 12 report to the Governor and, subject to § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, to the 13General Assembly of its activities for the preceding fiscal year. Each such report shall 14 set forth the complete operating and financial statement covering the Service's 15activities during such [year and] YEAR, the salaries for each position of the Service, 16 AND A SUMMARY OF ENERGY ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN BY THE SERVICE 17DURING SUCH YEAR. EACH REPORT SHALL DESCRIBE ANY COMPLAINT THE 18 SERVICE RECEIVES THAT INDICATES AN ENERGY ACTIVITY UNDERTAKEN BY 19 THE SERVICE COMPETES WITH PRIVATE INVESTMENT IN A SIMILAR ENERGY 20ACTIVITY.

22Except as otherwise provided by this subtitle, the Service may adopt, (a) 23formulate, revise, and enforce rules and regulations necessary for the regulation of its 24internal affairs and for the use and operation of its projects, and of any other laws the 25administration of which is vested in the Service. A rule or regulation concerning the 26use or operation of a project may not conflict with any rule, regulation, permit, or 27hauler certificate of the Department of the Environment. The Service may limit or 28regulate water supply or liquid waste service, refuse collection, disposal service, and 29 storm and surface water drainage service, in any area or to any premises served by 30 Service projects, as the exigencies of the occasion and the protection of its systems 31require. The Service may adopt lawful and reasonable regulations it considers 32 necessary for the public's health and safety, comfort, and convenience in the 33 construction, operation, maintenance, expansion, relocation, replacement, renovation, 34and repair of its water supply, wastewater [purification and] PURIFICATION, solid 35waste disposal, AND ENERGY projects.

36 (b) Rules and regulations shall be approved by the Board and adopted under 37 the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, except when necessary for the 38 immediate preservation of the public health and safety and except for emergency 39 provisions required to protect Service projects.

1 (c) Any regulation adopted by the Service under this section has the effect of 2 law.

4 If the Service and a municipality or person fail to reach agreement on (a)  $\mathbf{5}$ rates, fees, or other charges to be exacted by the Service FOR A WATER SUPPLY OR 6 WASTEWATER PURIFICATION PROJECT, the Public Service Commission, on the 7 petition of either party to the disagreement, shall assume jurisdiction for the purpose 8 of arbitrating the disagreement. Its determination shall be final and binding on all 9 parties concerned, subject to the right of any party to appeal the determination to the 10 circuit court of any county within which the municipality or person is located, resides, 11 or carries on business. In any appeal the decision of the Commission is prima facie 12correct and shall be affirmed unless clearly shown to be (1) in violation of 13constitutional provisions, or (2) made on unlawful procedure, or (3) arbitrary or 14 capricious, or (4) affected by other error of law. It is the intention of this subtitle that 15judicial review in all instances includes the right to appeal to the Court of Special 16 Appeals from the decision of the lower court. The provisions of this section and the 17jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission shall not apply to any rates, fees, or 18 charges agreed to by contract between the Service and a municipality or person FOR A 19 WATER SUPPLY OR WASTEWATER PURIFICATION PROJECT.

(b) The Service may not be deemed to be a public service company within the
meaning of the Public Utility Companies Article, and, except as provided in this
section AND IN § 3–102(B) OF THIS SUBTITLE, the jurisdiction and powers of the
Public Service Commission do not extend to the Service.

Any person who violates any provision of this subtitle or of any rule or regulation adopted by the Service is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction is subject to a fine not exceeding \$1,000 for each violation. A separate offense exists for each day a violation occurs.

30 This subtitle shall be known as the "Maryland Environmental Service Act".
